There's a new playground in the town of Aulander's future.

North Carolina Parks and Recreation Authority (Authority) approved a \$142,650 grant from the meeting held on Aug. 26 at the Na- the baseball field and renovations

ture Research Center in Raleigh.

Aulander will be constructing the new playground, along with public restrooms and a picnic shelter, grills, picnic tables and park benches. In addition, the grant will include resurfacing the existing walking, fitness track, installing state's Park and Recreation Trust new fitness stations signs, a new Fund (PARTF) for Aulander at its swing set, additional bleachers for

"This was a second PARTF Grant that the town applied for this funding cycle," said Aulander Commissioner Bobbie Parker. "We were very fortunate to be able to hire Emily Miller of McAdams and Associates as our grant writer. She also was the grant writer for our original PARTF Award."
