There are some fine things which come out of the adversities of life, depending, of course, upon the character of the people who have to meet them. Were it not so we should despair of life, for it is beset with many evils. I can not subscribe to the old idea that the calamities of life express the will of God; rather, they seek to thwart His will. But these forces do throw into greater prominence the character of good, and the majesty and the power of God. For, paradoxically, they suffer defeat in their victories.

Last week there passed away in our community a young woman of sweet Christian character. Her whole life had been one of battle. At an early age she lost her mother, and though receiving the devoted attentions of a sister, and other relatives, nothing can compensate the child in the loss of a mother. She cared for the best things in life, and sought to attain them. Her ambitions were high and pure. Faithful in every task, conducting herself with simple, yet beautiful propriety, lovable in disposition, warm and sincere in her friendships, she made many friends.

At twenty-two she was seized with tuberculosis, and with the same fine spirit of faith which had characterized her life she fought this enemy. Her courage and cheerfulness gave inspiration to all who watched her. Her body was frail, but her spirit was strong, her courage was splendid. She smiled through her tears when her body was racked with pain. She refused to acknowledge defeat, and in high faith she died. In this faith she triumphed, for she fought in the spirit of one who accepted the

death upon the cross and transformed it into a glorious victory. In Him she shares the triumph of the Resurrection.

In quiet, unassuming lives, such as hers, are found the stuff of which heroes and saints are made. Many of us will be better men and women for having watched her in her gallant fight. She has not lived in vain. If we want to honor her life let us fight evil in the world with her courage, faith and fortitude. Alma Raby lived but two and twenty years but lived those years so well that the Lord of life can say, "well done." The world is richer in faith and courage for her having lived.
