TORNADO HITS NORTH GEORGIA

away, together with the smokehouse, but the other half of the barn was left standing and Mr. Dockins' home was not seriously damaged.

It also was reported that one of two haystacks standing side by side was blown away while the other was unscathed.

The tornado cut a path ranging from 100 to 200 yards wide. Everything in its way was mowed down as if by a huge steam roller.

Sylvan Lake Wrecked
Sylvan Lake was one of the hardest hit communities in Rabun county. The club house was blown into the lake and 15 or 20 summer cottages were ruined.

In many places houses were razed to the ground, chimneys and all, with roofing and boards scattered over the countryside for hundreds of yards.

Strange to say, the death toll in Rabun county was reported as con-

sisting of one man, one cow, one horse and one dog. The woman killed, Mrs. Stancel, was struck in the head by a piece of timber. Her husband was injured, but according to reports Wednesday night was expected to recover. A number of other persons received minor injuries, but reports of miraculous escapes were more numerous than those of casualties.

The homeless are being cared for by neighbors. Work had started Wednesday morning in collecting the storm strewn bits of houses and barns in efforts to restore them. In many cases, however, restoration was out of the question.
