Greenville to Augusta, Ga. The western route, at present, goes from Corbin, Ky., to Knoxville and meets the eastern branch at Newport. The proposed relocation of U. S. 25-W would bring it from Knoxville to Gatlinburg, through the Smokies by Newfound Gap, thence to Smokemont and Bryson City and over N. C. 286 to Franklin. From here it would go by N. C. 28 to Highlands and over the Tri-State road, which is now being surfaced from Highlands to the South Carolina line, to Wall-halla, Anderson, Abbeville, McCormick and Augusta.
