

# Golf Tourney Starts Today At Highlands

## TOWN THROGGED WITH VISITORS

**As Good Or Better Season Than Last Year Expected at Mountain Resort**

The first of three golf tournaments to be sponsored by Highlands Country club this summer is underway this week. The qualifying rounds were to be held today and the contest, an invitation tournament, will end Saturday afternoon.

Four outstanding entrants are Charlie Yates, Atlanta city champion and Georgia state champion; Julius Hughes, former Atlanta city champion; Berrien Moore and Scott Hudson, Jr. These men, all of Atlanta, composed the winning foursome in the Southern Golf association tournament in Birmingham last week. They were also included among the 16 players qualifying for individual honors in the first flight in the Birmingham tournament.

The number of entrants expected could not be estimated Wednesday. Others who were definitely lined up, however, included Morton Hodgson and son, Bob, of Athens, Ga.; G. Bemis, Roger H. Smith, of Highlands; D. B. Dabney, of Walhalla; F. J. Woods, of Tampa; George R. Sims, of Newport Richy, Fla.; Charles H. Black, Jr., of Atlanta; former holder of various titles; R. D. Sawtell, of Atlanta, and Scott Hudson, president of the Highlands Country club.

### Many Visitors Present

Visitors from many points in the south are here to witness the tournament. A second and third tournament will be held in July and August. The July tournament will be open to both men and women. Mired foursomes will play. Mr. Hudson, president of the club, stated that, although the season in general will be below normal for the number of tourists throughout the country, Highlands and the country club will probably have as good or better season than usual because of their unique position in the mountains. More reservations have been made at the club this year than had been made at the same time last season, Mr. Hudson said.

Among the prominent visitors is R. W. Woodruff, of Atlanta, president of the Coca-Cola company, who has rented the Hagah house on the country club property, and will spend the summer here with his family.

### Club Now Open

The country club opened June 10. It is located on a plateau, the average altitude of which is 4,118 feet above sea level, near the Blue Ridge divide. Away from the summer heat, where huge log fires are comfortable even on mid-summer nights, the club and golf course are unique. The mountain scenery is unsurpassed in the east. Now the brilliant flame azalea is in bloom along with laurel. Rhododendron of various species is blooming now or will begin to bloom about July 1.

## Highlands To Have Daily Bible School for Children

A daily vacation Bible school, with D. H. Daniel, of Louisville, Ky., as principal, will open in the Highlands school next Monday. The school will be conducted for children between five and 17 years old.

There will be three sections, with Miss Rachel Davis as superintendent of the beginners department, assisted by Miss Oceola Everette and Miss Virginia Pierson. Miss Bessie Neely will be superintendent of the primary department and will be assisted by Mrs. G. A. Hovis, the Misses Mary Paul and Stella Marrett, and Raymond McCarty. An announcement by Mr. Daniel says: "There will be no tuition and no books except in the hands of the teachers. No home study will be required. Everything the boys and girls need in the school will be furnished free. The cost of the school will be taken care of by free-will offerings at the close of the school.

"We shall teach the children portions of the Bible suited to their ages, have scripture gems memorized, tell them many interesting stories—Biblical, patriotic, habit-forming, missionary—have supervised play periods, periods for music and notebook work, salutes of the Christian and American flags, and a closing period of handwork."

## Road-Surfacing Work Near Highlands About Finished

A state highway department force is completing this week the laying of a traffic bound macadam surface on the Walhalla road to the Georgia line and on the Dillard road to the Highlands Country club. The surfacing on both routes is 14 feet wide.

With the laying of stone on the Three-states road, also known as Highway No. 282, the route to Walhalla, S. C., is completely surfaced with the exception of a nine-mile stretch in Georgia. Efforts have been made to secure the cooperation of Georgia so that the entire distance may be surfaced, but nothing definite has yet resulted.

Whether an asphalt binder will be placed on the newly surfaced portions is a matter of conjecture, for the state highway department has made no announcement concerning its plans.

The surfacing of the Dillard road to the country club is a piece of work which has been greatly needed since the establishment of this popular resort center a mile and a half from Highlands. The link is much used and is expected to increase the patronage of the club because of the added convenience and appearance.

No. 28, on which work has been in progress for several years, is entirely completed and open from Franklin through Highlands to Breward and Hendersonville. It is being extensively used.

## FINISHES MAP OF HIGHLANDS

**Thomas Greville Completes Unique Topographical Drawing**

Probably the most complete map of Highlands and vicinity ever to be issued has been completed by Thomas Greville, of Highlands, who is a post graduate student at the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor.

Mr. Greville spent a great deal of time last summer preparing the map. It is entirely accurate and includes main motor roads, secondary roads, roads passable by auto, poor roads or unopened streets, trails, contour lines, elevations, town, county and national forest boundaries, mountain summits, viewpoints and waterfalls. An enlarged map of the Town of Highlands is included in a corner of the main map.

The map was photo-lithographed and bound by Edward Brothers, incorporated, of Ann Arbor.

Mr. Greville has announced no plans for putting the map on sale, but it is believed that he will have copies in Highlands shortly that may be obtained for a small sum.
