The Psalmist prayed that he might be delivered from presumptuous sins. This would have been a great prayer for the generation to which many of us belong. Jesus knew that He was safe in His Father's keeping, yet He refused to fly into the face of the law of gravitation, and throw Himself from the Temple. Trust and obedience go together. Every thought and every act of man have corresponding effects. God does not punish; we simply reap what we have sown. So, even though we have professed trust in God, we have done so presumptuously, and built up a kingdom which is more material than spiritual. Should we be surprised then that we are suffering the ill effects today of having violated law? God has promised to keep us within His law, not outside it.

28 STUDENTS AT CULLOWHEE FROM MACON COUNTY

CULLOWHEE, June 22 (Special)—Macon county is well represented in the Summer school at Western Carolina Teachers' college this summer. Out of a total enrollment of 204, Macon claims as her sons and daughters 28. This is the second largest enrollment from any of the counties. Jackson leads with an enrollment of 37 and Swain takes third place with 25. North Carolina contributes 185, divided among 38 counties; South Carolina 12, Georgia 3, Tennessee 3 and Florida 1.

FOREST SERVICE TO ESTABLISH 3 WEATHER STATIONS

John B. Byrne, supervisor of the Nantahala National Forest, has announced plans for the establishment of a number of weather stations in this section. Roland Pierce, from New York state, who is in charge of the weather forecasting department of the national forests, has been in Franklin for several days. He and Mr. Byrne have traveled over sections of three states selecting sites for the proposed stations.

One station will be located in South Carolina, one in Rabun county, Georgia, and one in Macon county. Three places in the county are under consideration: Kyle, Wayah Bald, and Franklin.

Asheville will be headquarters for these reports, and during the forest fire season, reports will be sent in daily. This will keep the department advised ahead on the weather conditions and enable it to be ready when a fire threatens.
