J. Howard Rogers Painting Landscape Beauties

Much attention has been attracted to the art work of J. Howard Rogers, who has just returned to Highlands after a sojourn of several years in Asheville.

Several of Mr. Rogers' oil paintings are on exhibit at Potts Brothers store. These pictures express an independent strain of thought; they are distinctive in style, which does not mean they are startling or modernistic. To the contrary, they are realistic and colorful.

Work on Highway 28 To Jackson County

Work was begun last Wednesday on the stretch of Highway 28 from Highlands to the Jackson county line. A crew of about 25 state highway workers are busy laying on the final coat of tar known as "sealing wax." They began at the Jackson county line at Sunrise View and are gradually working toward Highlands, surfacing about a mile a day. One tar machine is being used and a fleet of trucks to put the necessary gravel on. Twenty-eight, leading out of Highlands, is, of course, closed at the time of writing due to this work, but will be open again next week.

He is resourceful in more ways than one; he has constructed an anvil from an old railroad loop and helped a son make shoes for a mule from an automobile spring. He has tanned twenty-two hides this year since laying up his corn.
