\$375 IS QUOTA FOR RED CROSS

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Secretary of the Local District Relief Committee: "The Red Cross Chapter has just received another car load of flour. In all probability this supply will have to last over a period of the next three months. To see that this is distributed to the best advantage and to go only to people who are in actual need, it is very necessary that you call your local committee together at once and make a very painstaking survey of your school district in order to estimate how many bags of flour will be actually needed in your community. Please make out a list, giving the name of the head of the family and the number of members of each family with the number of bags of flour in all probability each family will require during the next three months and mail this so as to reach me by or before November 16; this list to be signed by all members of your committee. On receipt of the estimate from each district I will then check over the needs from each one and will decide if the full amount requested can be supplied from the quantity on hand. I urge you to make your requirements as limited as possible in order that each district may receive enough to meet its pressing needs. Even then the requests may have to be scaled down in some or all communities. The flour will be sent out on November 19 to your place provided the people of your community arrange for somebody to come for it that day. Let whoever comes after the flour bring with him an order requesting that it be delivered to him, signed by all the members of the committee.

are not available, it is known that comparatively few absentee ballots were cast. This was somewhat of a surprise in view of the pre-election charges of W. J. West that the Democrats were attempting "to steal the election" with absentees. In Franklin precinct a count showed only 207 absentees had been voted and about one-third of these were by Republicans. With the exception of a few minor disturbances caused by drunks, the election was very orderly. (A tabulation of complete but unofficial returns on the county ticket will be found on the back page.)
