BIRD OF THE YEAR

Miner Tags Thousands of Ducks and Geese Every Year

Two weeks ago Macon were keenly interested in that C. A. Waldrop, commissioner, had killed a goose with an aluminum tag attached to one leg with the following words on it: "Write Jack Miner, Kingsville, Ontario, Canada." Jack Miner was communicated with at once and it was learned that he was the owner of the Jack Miner Bird Sanctuary at Kingsville, Ontario, Canada, and tags all the ducks, geese and other smaller migratory birds that visit his bird sanctuary, to study their routes of migration and also how long they live. Furthermore, it gives Jack Miner full information as to the States and Provinces killing the greater number of birds; how long they stay in the United States; and how long they remain in Canada.

All records are given to the Canadian Government for safe keeping to use for educational purposes in the schools, colleges and universities of the country.

Scripture Verse

All tags placed on ducks and geese have printed on one side a verse of Scripture—Jack Miner's unique way of spreading the Gospel. He is by no means a religious fanatic, but is a strong believer in God's Word, and uses the fowls of the air to spread such select verses of Scripture as: "Have faith in God," "No good thing will He withhold from them that walk uprightly," and many other similar promises. Jack Miner says, "It has been the means of many a Bible being opened by men who had scarcely ever read the Scriptures. Even in many prisons, prisoners had read in daily papers of such birds being killed and that they carried a verse of Scripture. This caused the prisoner to turn his face toward God and repent."

Jack Miner is a poor man financially and will die a poor man because he is not only giving his whole time to study of bird life but is and has given every cent of money he possesses to feed and care for the feathered creatures which spend their summer and raise their young in Canada, and winter in the United States. In his own words the bird man tells of his earlier life, and of his experiments and study of the habits of wild fowl:

Jack Miner's Story

At the age of thirteen I was brought from the dear old State of Ohio and liberated here in Canada (a sportsman's paradise). I took to the woods as naturally as a park hare, and soon everything from the Bob-White quail to the lordly moose became easy, as I studied their habits closely. There were twelve of us in our family, and a dollar bill looked like a horse blanket, so my eldest brother and I took to hunting for the market; and as practice makes perfect, we soon became expert shots, and by times left a bloody trail behind us.

However, thank God, we soon outgrew that cold-blooded practice, and hunted for sport only as market hunting is not sport, but murder in the first degree. Sad to say, on November 15, 1898, my dear brother was called from me and taken over the Great Divide into the beautiful beyond, so that we are separated for a while. This made me study more than ever. I had positive proof that the wildest of these creatures knew us as their deadly enemies. This caused the low-hanging clouds to separate, letting through the light of the following beautiful thought: Surely they would know a friend if they had one; and although my attractions are all artificial, that lovable message is now a reality, for I have thousands of these feathered witnesses that actually know my voice and at times will come down when I call them. I have learned a few notes of the wild goose language, so that you may blindfold me and I will tell you a small percentage of their actions. I now have tags returned to me off the wild geese from North Carolina to Baffin Land, and over a hundred
