In accordance with its time-honored custom, the 1915 MacDowell Music club was at home to its friends on the evening of Thursday, February 23, with Mrs. N. C. Duncan as hostess at the rectory. Each club member was privileged to ask two guests.

Miss Edwina Dalrymple welcomed the guests with a few well chosen words about the purpose of the club, the habit of honoring MacDowell's birthday anniversary, and a tribute to the founder, Miss Irene Weaver.

The opening number of the program was a chorus, "Hiawatha's Journey"—music by Ira Wilson, and the familiar Longfellow words. The lead was sung by James Porter with a well blended chorus consisting of the Misses Roseland Bulsion, Willie Mae Ledford, Elsie Ader and Edwina Dalrymple, with Mrs. Duncan at the piano. Although this number was not written by MacDowell, it was by an American composer and was in keeping with the spirit of a MacDowell program.

Mrs. Howard Horsley gave an interesting sketch of MacDowell's life, emphasizing the inspiration such great American composers should give to young composers.

Miss Elsie Ader played delightfully a short and not too well known sketch of MacDowell's called "In Autumn," from the "Woodland Sketches."

Miss Virginia Slagle came next with "Bluetie," another rarely heard and most charming melody of this versatile composer.

Mrs. Henry Cabe followed with the ever popular "Witches' Dance," played with her customary dash and verve.

Variety was given the program by a musical reading by Mrs. Eugene Eller with Mrs. Harry Higgins at the piano, which was much enjoyed.

James Porter played MacDowell's "A. D. 1620" most artistically, with true understanding and appreciation.

Miss Dalrymple gave an excellent interpretation of the lovely and little known "Song" by MacDowell. The program was brought to a close with another chorus by Mr. Porter and the young ladies. This prize winning essays written by

chorus was called "Sundown," set to the familiar and much loved "Londonderry Air." It brought out Mr. Porter's rich, deep voice excellently and was a fitting climax to an unusually well chosen and executed program, featuring some of MacDowell's less hackneyed works.

After the program punch and cakes were served and a short social hour was much enjoyed. To the older members present the program quite measured up to the high standard set and maintained by the club in the past.
