TARIFF BILL GIVES

PRESIDENT BROAD POWERS Unprecedented authority to ne gotiate reciprocal tariff agreements was given President Roosevelt Wednesday by congress. Almost immediately two nations, Germany and Argentina, took action seeking to be among the first to negotiate new trade pacts. Granting of this unusual authority to the chief executive came when the house of representatives accepted senate amendments to the tariff bill, which The president was expected to sign without delay.

STOCK CONTROL BILL ENACTED

The stock market control bill was signed Wednesday by President Roosevelt. The first step to be taken under the measure is the appointment of a board of five members to administer and enforce its provisions.
