Sale of Land for '33 Taxes Ordered by County, Town

Sale of real estate for delinquent 1933 taxes was ordered both by the county commissioners and the Franklin town council Monday.

The commissioners directed the sheriff to begin this week to advertise land for unpaid county taxes for the past fiscal year and to offer it for sale at the courthouse door the first Monday in September.

The town council ordered the

clerk to begin advertising land for delinquent town taxes next week and to sell on the second Monday in September.

The action of each body was in compliance with provisions of the machinery act of the 1933 general assembly which leaves no alternative open to local governing bodies.

After the tax collectors' sales, certificates bearing interest will be issued to the purchasers, giving them lien rights.

LEVY FOR 1934

Town Rate of 80 Cents Levied, Increase Of 5 Cents

A tax rate of \$1 on the \$100 valuation has been set for the current fiscal year by the Macon county commissioners, it was learned this week. This is a reduction of five cents under the 1933 rate and of 21 cents under the 1932 rate.
