Edna Snyder, from Cornelia, Ga., spent the week-end with home folks.

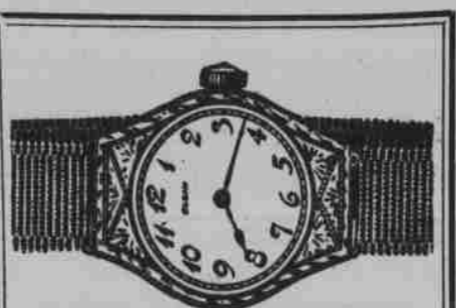
The regular preaching Sunday here has been changed from the third Sunday to the second Sunday.
