

Plans for the fourth annual farm tour of Macon county sponsored by the Franklin Rotary club were announced this week by F. S. Sloan, county farm agent and a member of the Rotary committee on arrangements for the event. Wednesday, August 29, has been set as the date for the tour.

This year the Rotary club is extending invitations to all the business men of Franklin to join with Rotarians and farmers in making the tour, one of the chief purposes of which is to bring about a better understanding and a closer spirit of cooperation between farmers and business men.
