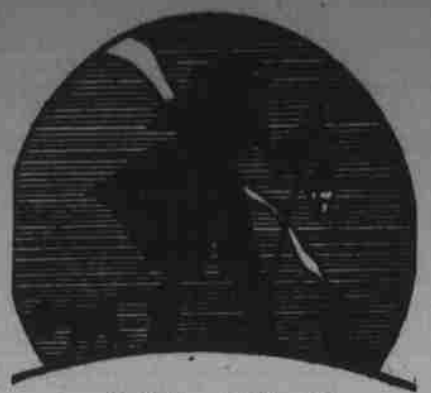

Mr. and Mrs. Tudor Hall made a trip to Asheville Wednesday. Harry Holt was in Highlands Tuesday.

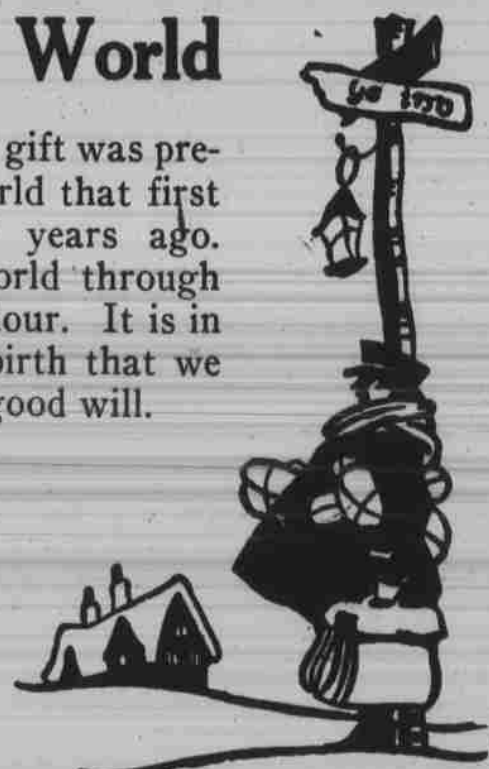
