
Mr. Clouse is survived by his widow, sixteen children and twenty-three grandchildren.

From a close study of the Mees & Mees report, the topographical maps 'available and the territory in and about Franklin there is no doubt that the Cartoogechaye creek is the proper source from which to secure an additional supply of water. This creek is very favorably located, as to source of supply for Franklin, being far enough away to avoid contamination from future growth and yet within an economical distance. The supply is ample for any future needs and the water shed conditions are ideal.

A water supply from Lake Emory would probably be more economical in first cost, but the upstream contamination as well as contamination from Franklin itself makes it less desirable. ### **Population and Growth:**

The growth in population of Franklin for the past thirty years shows an average increase of approximately 50 per cent for each ten years. Considering the fact that the mountainous section of North Carolina has received and is receiving a tremendous amount of publicity it is not unreasonable to anticipate an equal rate of growth for the next several decades. On this basis we have:

Population for 1940......1,695 Population for 1950......2,542

Assuming a per capita use of water of 100 gallons per day, which is a reasonable figure to use in such calculations, especially conapproximately one-half million gallons per day in 1965. The year 1960 would require almost constant operation of a half-million gallon filter plant. This is as small a plant as it is economical to build.

The old bridge abutments on the plan provides for the location of a small pump house just beyond the high water line of the creek. Water will flow to the pump house by gravity through a 10 inch terra cotta pipe. Two 380 gallon per minute pumps are located in the pump station, one electrically driven and one connected to a gasoline engine. This provides continuous operation in case of electrical troubles.

The water is pumped directly to the filter plant through an 8 inch cast iron main.

Any veteran who had more than 60 days of service in the World War, or any dependent of a veteran who is dead, who has not applied for a "bonus" certificate, is advised to take immediate steps to county chapter of the American the construction of the tank on Red Cross has offered to assist

> their certificates are urged to get lief. chairman of the local Red Cross organization. Mr. Lancaster, whose services in this connection are voluntary and without charge, has requested that veterans bring with

them their honorable discharges so that their applications may be filed without delay.

Veterans eligible for the "bonus" certificates must have served more than sixty days during the war period-April 5, 1927-November 11, 1918, and have been honorably discharged. Certain high ranking commissioned officers, civilian employees of the Army and a few other similar classes are not eligible.

Dependents of veterans who died in the service, or since, who failed to apply for the certificates, or who died after filing, but before receiving certificate, should make application before it is too late. Widows and children have preference over dependent parents. If there is no widow or child, a dependent mother may file, or if the mother is not entitled, a dependent father may file. Dependency of parents is presumed after age 60, and before that age evidence of dependency must be presented.
