WELFARE WORK IS DISCUSSED

visor of adult school work, under WPA, reported 44 teachers employed six hours a day, with 930 pupils over 16 years old. Of a population of 13,672 in 1930 there were 504 white illiterates and 78 colored. Mrs. Trotter stated with an expression of hope that permanent adult schools would be established in the county.

Volunteer agencies represented include prison work, the Boy and Girl Scouts, the Red Cross and others.

Prison Work

Speaking of the Bible class and school work carried on at the state prison camp, Roy Dady told of the warm response to the efforts of the Brotherhood Bible Class in conducting for the past year and a half a Sunday school class, through which a school with regular classes has been developed among the prisoners themselves. High tribute was paid to Mrs. James Ordway, who has kept the prisoners supplied with reading matter collected from Franklin citizens.

Mrs. Ordway made a brief summary of these contributions, expressing appreciation of the unflinching cooperation and generous response from citizens, prison officials, and others, special reference being made to the work of Mr. Ramsey, former superintendent, without whose interest the work would not have been possible.

Much interest was shown in a letter read by the Rev. C. C. Herbert from R. B. Watts, principal of the Chapel school, calling attention to the great need of the colored school and children and appealing for aid through some of the federal agencies. Mr. Herbert suggested that a group of members of the Inter-racial commission in the county, of which he is a member, make an effort to improve conditions at this school.

The Rev. W. M. Burns, pastor of the Franklin Baptist church, was introduced to the meeting and made a helpful talk, telling of his work at one of the CCC camps. The Rev. J. A. Flanagan spoke on the subject of the Red Cross and the local chapter's readiness to help cases in need.

The speakers were introduced by Mrs. J. W. C. Johnson, who called attention to the fact that the meeting was planned in connection with National Child Welfare Week, the gathering voting at the suggestion of Mr. Herbert that the occasion be made at least an annual affair. More than 30 workers and friends attended.
