FUNERAL HELD FOR PRICE C. CALLOWAY, 74

HIGHLANDS, May 13.—Funeral services for Prince C. Calloway, 74, who died of pneumonia at his home here Monday, were held at 3 o'clock Tuesday afternoon at the Highlands Methodist church with the pastor, the Rev. W. F. Beadle, officiating. Mr. Calloway was born March 17, 1862. On May 6, 1881, he was married to Miss Charlotte Chambers, who survives him. They had 12 children, of whom nine are now living. Their grandchildren number 39 and there are 37 great-grandchildren.

The sons and daughters surviving Mr. Calloway are Samuel L. Calloway, Highlands; E. T. Calloway, Franklin; Tom Calloway, Highlands; Joe Calloway, Houston, Tex.; Claude and John Calloway, Highlands; Mrs. Walter Turner, Covington, Ga.; Mrs. Leonard Langston, Anderson, S. Mr. Calloway was buried with Masonic honors. F. H. Potts, of Blue Ridge lodge, officiated. Pallbearers were Mack McKinney, W. W. McKinney, W. W. Edwards, O. F. Summer, Quincy Hedden and Preileau Hedden.

Mr. Calloway, who was always interested in the civic affairs of the county, had served on the school board for five years. He was a Mason and a member of the Methodist church.

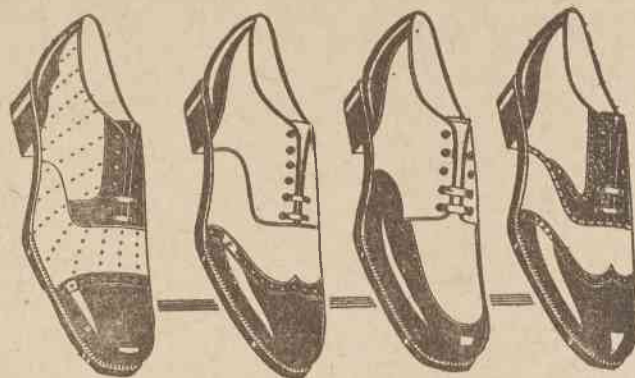
Mr. and Mrs. E. P. Harkey have returned to Atlanta for a few days after being at their lakeside home here for several weeks.

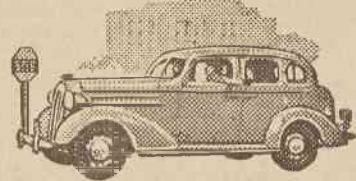

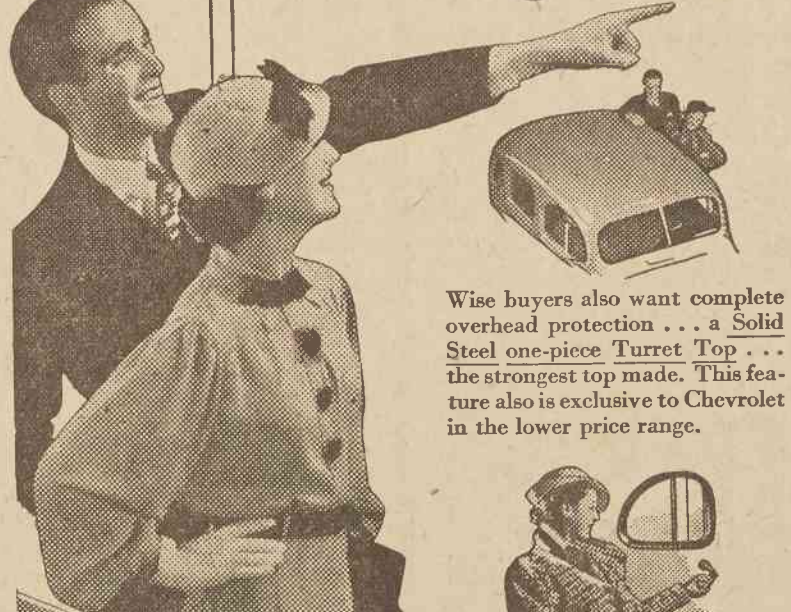
