IMPORTANT RULES FOR SUCCESSFUL CANNING

1. Begin counting the time for cooking after the water is boiling. Keep the water boiling.

2. Prevent loss of liquid by having and keeping the water one inch over the tops of jars. Keep the water boiling.

3. Never open jars to refill with liquid.

4. Satisfactory results in canning vegetables will be secured by using fresh, sound firm products; canning the product while it is still fresh; putting each jar into processing vessel as soon as packed; processing for specified time, and completely sealing jar as soon as taken from processing vessel.

Corn, cow peas and lima beans expand during the processing period. Pack loosely to within one inch of top of jar to allow for expansion.

Other products shrink, and the jar can be filled to within one-half inch of the top.

CANNING PEAS

Cloudiness in peas can be prevented by using young unbruised peas and grading for uniformity. Small peas will cook to pieces before larger peas are cooked. Use soft water for blanching. Hard water contains minerals which affect the color of peas and beets.

DIRECTIONS FOR CANNING PEAS

Shell, grade, boil three to five minutes, depending on size; pack loosely within one inch of top of jar, boil four hours 20 minutes in water bath or cook in pressure cooker for one hour at 12 pounds pressure. A pressure cooker is recommended for safe canning of peas.

DIRECTIONS FOR CANNING BEETS

Wash, retain one inch of stem, boil 15 minutes, slip skins, pack. Process two and a half hours in water bath, 40 minutes at 12 pounds pressure in pressure cooker.



THE FAMILY DOCTOR

A SMALL FIRE CAN BE STOPPED

When a fire breaks out, we sound the alarm; we hurry-scurry, breathless, excited—call the department—turn on the hose—a house is burning! If the fire is discovered in time, the building is saved.

Now these bodies of ours are the veritable houses we live in, and they sometimes catch fire, as physicians know. Then we begin to procrastinate; we wonder if the fever—fire won't die out of itself, if we keep on at work and let it alone. We hate to go to a doctor—and we can't really afford to lay off and be sick! You know how it is.

The fire grows into a holocaust. The physician fire-chief, is called in a hurry; he finds the building in great danger of destruction, if not a total loss—just by neglect of the small fire.

If you are running a temperature—a little every afternoon—which breaks into a perspiration just after going to bed at night, consult your physician at once. The stitch in time may save a hundred later on. A fever invariably means that something is radically wrong; it is a warning. A battle is going on inside—the forces of good against the demons of evil. The cause of the warfare must be removed.

If your child is running a temperature, look after his throat, his lungs, his digestive tract; he has a poison somewhere. Find it and force its elimination. But, be sure you are right before you do anything. You cannot afford mistakes. They cost lots of money, and may cost a life. Don't neglect the small fire; it is the easier put out. "First aid" is, to clean house. Apply water outside and inside. And put nothing into the body that might feed the flame. Call the doctor in time.

FEDERATION TO PAY DIVIDEND

3 Per Cent Semi-Annual Payment To Be Made June 20

Dividends on Farmers Federation stock were again declared by the board of directors executive committee to be paid June 20, according to James G. K. McLure, Jr., president.

The payment will be 3% for the first half of 1936, thus maintaining the 6% dividend rate for five consecutive payments. The payment will be made to stockholders of record June 20.

The farm co-operative organization now operates 14 warehouses in eight Western North Carolina counties, handling farm supplies, and marketing certain products for the farmers.

Starting with one small warehouse at Fairview Siding in Buncombe county in 1920, the organization has grown on a cooperative basis one unit at a time as additional farmers and other citizens wanted to start a warehouse for their community, and subscribe to capital stock.

Each county with the Farmers Federation unit is represented by two members of the board of directors. The ones from this county being Carl Slagle, from Franklin, and Ed Byrd of Stiles. Lawrence Ramsey is manager of the Franklin warehouse.

Rare U. S. Dimes
