Miss Margaret Adelaide McGuire Weds John Warner Cooper Saturday Afternoon

In a ceremony of beautiful simplicity, Miss Margaret Adelaide McGuire, daughter of Mrs. William B. McGuire, of Franklin, was married to John Warner Cooper, son of Mr. and Mrs. Warner Rowe Cooper, of Athens, Ga., on Saturday afternoon, June 5, at 5 o'clock

on the spacious lawn at the home of the bride's mother.

The dignity and beauty of the occasion were enhanced by Mrs. C. C. Herbert, Jr., of Franklin, singing in her rich contralto voice, "Calm as the Night," by Bohm, followed by the wedding hymn, "O, Perfect Love," by Barnby. She was accompanied at the piano by John E. Brown, of Hendersonville. Following Mrs. Herbert's solo, the Rev. John Arthur Flanagan, pastor of the Franklin Presbyterian church, took his place before an arch entwined with ivy and banked with mountain laurel and evergreens. With the first strains of the wedding march from Lohengrin the procession appeared on the veranda and descending the steps entered a carpeted aisle leading to the altar.

The ushers were James Cooper, of Athens, Ga., brother of the groom; John A. Bulgin and George B. Bulgin, cousins of the bride, and John R. Smith, all of Franklin; Fred Birchmore, of Athens, Ga., and Roger Huff, of Cleveland, Tenn.

Following the ushers came the bridesmaids, dainty and colorful in gowns of crisp organza. Miss Mildred Cooper, of Athens, Ga., sister of the groom, and Miss Rosalind Bulgin, cousin of the bride, of Franklin, wore green; in delightful contrast were Miss Elizabeth McGuire, of Franklin, sister of the bride, and Miss Elizabeth Dowdle, of Franklin, in orchid. They were followed by Mrs. C. R. McCarty, of Highlands, and Miss Dorothy Eaton, of Charlotte, in blue. Each bridesmaid carried an old-fashioned bouquet of spring flowers and wore a coronet to match. After these attendants has taken their place at the altar, the maid of honor, Miss Virginia McGuire, twin sister of the bride, entered alone. A gown of peach organza, similar in design to those worn by the bridesmaids, accented her brunette loveliness. She carried a nosegay of old fashioned flowers and wore a matching coronet.

As the bride entered, radiant in her mother's wedding gown, the

groom and his brother, Edward N. Cooper, of Greenville, Tenn., serving as best man, took their places at the right of the altar. The bride, who was given in marriage by her brother, William B. The bride is a graduate of the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro. Mr. Cooper is district ranger of the Hiwassee district of the Cherokee national forest. He was graduated from the School of Forestry of the University of Georgia, where he was a member of Alpha Xi Sigma and Phi Kappa Phi fraternities.

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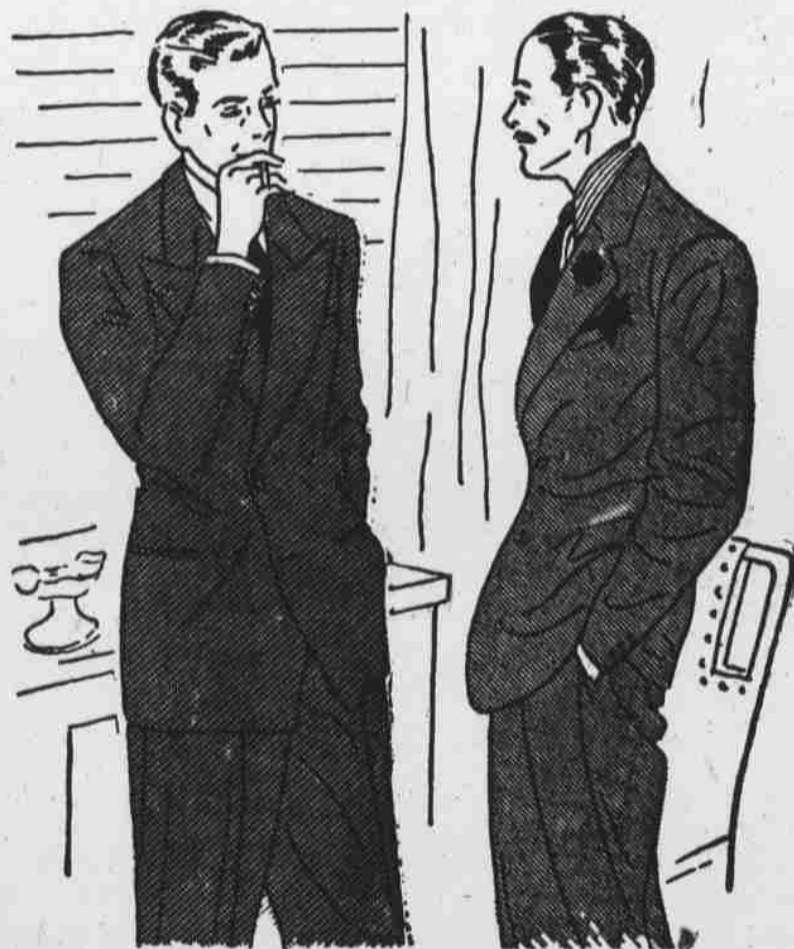


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
