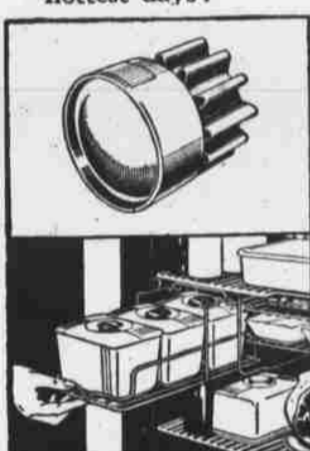
John T. Young, of Athens, Ga., came up Sunday to visit his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Young, at their home on Route 2.

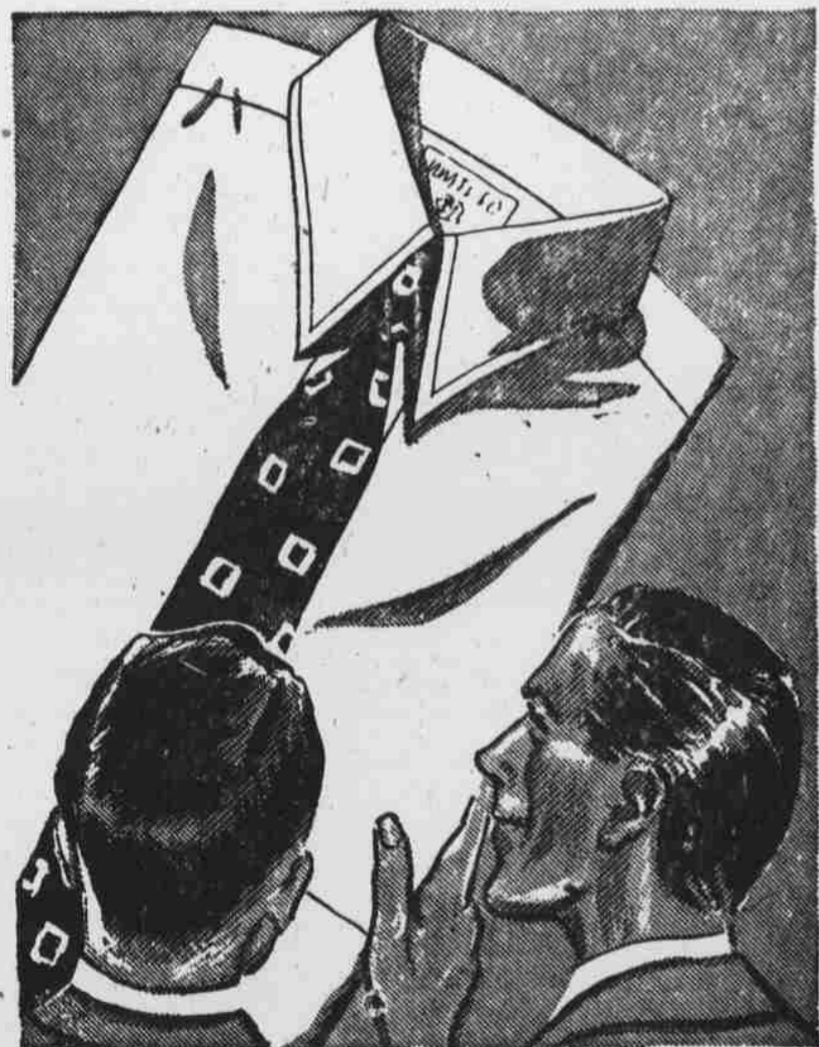
