Two Nantahala CCC Camps Rate Highest

Officials of the Nantahala national forest, with hearquarters at Franklin, stated that two CCC camps within the forest were given the highest ratings within their respective sub-districts by army inspectors for the month of July.

Camp N. C. F-11, near Unaka, N. C., in subdistrict "C", and camp N. C. F-24, near Robbinsville, N. C., in sub-district "B", were the camps receiving this honor.

Both of these camps are located within the Nantahala ranger district on this forest.

The points considered in the ratings were the sanitary conditions, morale, condition of the buildings and grounds as well as the food served at the camps.

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
