from a sinus operation which she underwent at Angel hospital last week.

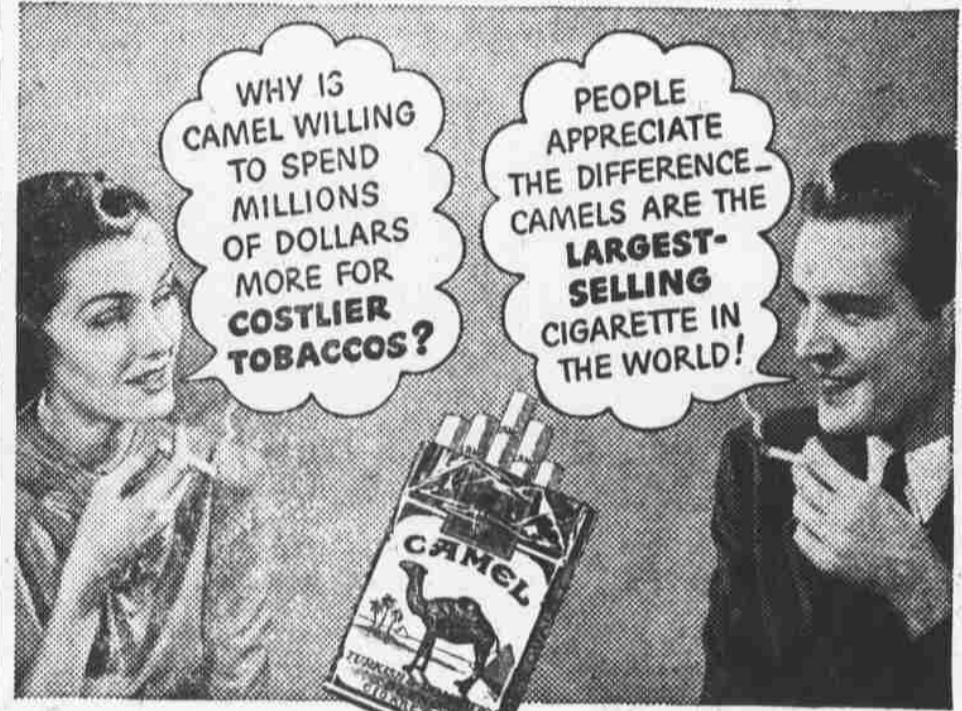
