

Phosphate To Orchard

Use for lime and acid in orchard management reported by H. K. Niswonger, extension horticulturist at college.

An county farmer has been using phosphate to rid his apple orchard of broom sedge and get lespedeza to grow in the orchard as a soil-building crop. But the results were discouraging.

Lespedeza was sown on the orchard in 1935 as a cover crop. In 1936 it was obvious that the broom sedge was crowding out the lespedeza.

Then the grower applied lime and triple superphosphate to the land at the rate of 200 pounds per acre. This materials, however, did not reach all the way under the trees.

This year, the limed and phosphated area showed a good growth of lespedeza that had conquered the broom sedge.

But under the trees where there was no lime or phosphate, the broom sedge was still growing vigorously and all the lespedeza had been killed out.

Lespedeza makes a good cover crop for an orchard, Niswonger pointed out, because it checks erosion, helps the soil absorb and hold rainwater, and when plowed under, adds nitrogen and organic matter to the soil.

While broom sedge checks erosion, it is classed as a soil-depleting crop. It takes from the land fertility that should be conserved for the fruit trees.

State College Answers Timely Farm Questions

Q. How many pigs can be turned into a lot where steers are being fattened?

A. This depends upon the form in which the concentrate is fed and the age of the steers. For two-year old animals from one to three pigs should follow each steer when snapped corn is fed; one to two pigs when husked ear corn is fed; one pig per steer when shelled corn is used, and one pig to each two or three steers when the corn is crushed or ground. With steers that are less than two years old, the number of pigs would be reduced. In addition to the feed picked up in the lot, the pigs should be given an animal protein supplement and minerals.

Q. What is the best time to sow seeds in coldframes or hotbeds for the early spring garden?

A. The best time to sow seeds will depend upon the time the plants are wanted in the field and also upon the section. Hardy crops such as cabbages and lettuce are usually transplanted to the field as early as January 15 in the eastern part of the state. In the mountain sections, these hardy crops are started in the hotbeds or coldframes about January 1 to 15. For a very early crop, such tender vegetables as tomatoes and peppers should be started from 8 to 10 weeks before it is safe to set them in the field and for the main summer crops the seed should be sown from three to four weeks before danger of frost is over.

Q. Should oyster shell be kept before the laying hens at all times?

A. These minerals may be substituted with ground limestone but one or the other should be accessible to the laying flock all the time. The mineral content of the hen's body is nearly four per cent and the mineral content of the egg is 11 per cent so it is necessary that the birds have certain mineral elements for growth and repair of the body. Other necessary minerals are bone meal and salt. These elements supply calcium, phosphorus and chlorine.

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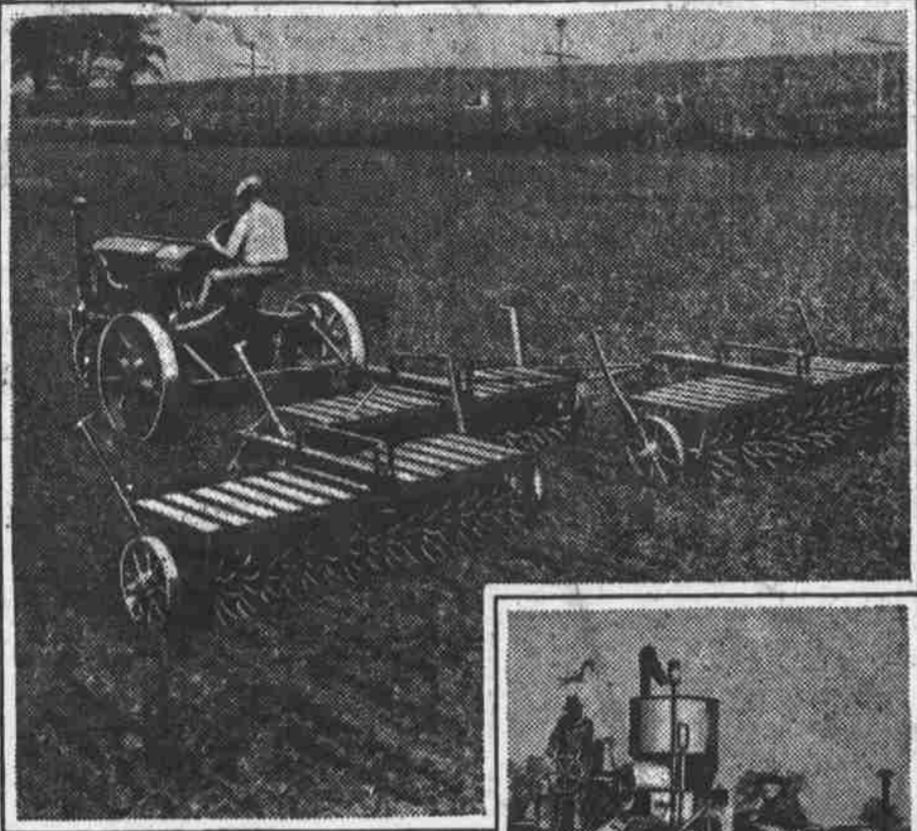

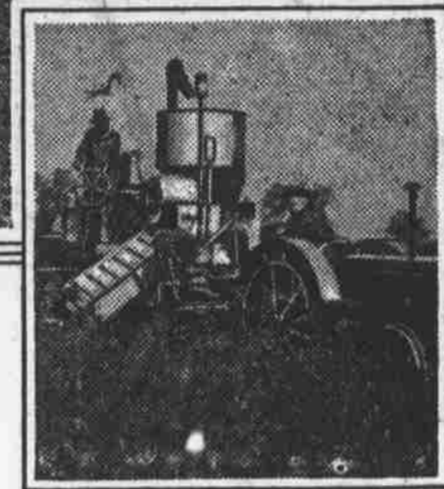
