

Blair Urges Growers To Plan 1938 Crops

"Plan your crops for 1938 and then have your county agent visit your farm to help you start a definite rotation," is the advice which E. C. Blair, State college extension agronomist, is giving North Carolina farmers as they start the New Year.

If such a plan is not possible, the grower should take stock of every field, decide what is to be planted on it, what fertilizer is to be used, and then make arrangements to get his seed and fertilizer at once, Blair said.

In preparing for the coming growing season, Piedmont farmers should run their plows every day that weather and the condition of the soil permit. On many soils in this section, it is imperative to turn under clovers and lespedeza early. This is necessary in order to prevent damage to corn crops from bud worms and to be able to prepare a good seed bed.

All other lands not growing a winter crop should be turned in January if not plowed in December. Once plowed and left rough, winter will do the necessary harrowing, Blair said.

Spring oats sowed at any time during the current month will make a better crop than oats sowed in March or April, the agronomist explained.

Coastal Plain growers should finish turning under all corn stalks, cotton stalks, tobacco stalks, soybeans, cowpeas, velvet bean vines, or any other crop residue from 1937.

Blair pointed out that the plant food in this material cannot be utilized in 1938 unless it is disced into the soil in time to fully decay before spring. Getting rid of the stalks this way also makes it easier to cultivate crops next summer.

Cattle Prices Drop In Past Two Months

Cattle prices which rode the crest of the wave in September and October have dropped sharply in the past two months with an outlook for still further declines.

L. I. Case, extension beef cattle specialist, at State college, declared the anticipated drop in finished cattle prices came much sooner than looked for, as well as being

steeper than expected.

The Chicago top for weighty steers in September and October came close to \$20 per hundred on numerous occasions. Recent quotations list the cattle at \$13 or a drop of nearly \$7.

Picturing the effect in North Carolina, Case pointed out as example 10 head of show cattle that were sold during the state fair in middle October for an average of \$15 per hundred.

Three weeks later at the Asheville fat stock show, cattle of equal or better quality sold for only \$11 per hundred. Today the same animals would not bring over \$8 or \$9 at the outside.

The drop in prices of the higher grades of cattle is much more severe than in the plainer kinds, although all have been affected seriously, Case pointed out.

Prices during the next few months will probably fall even lower than they are now unless industrial activities show a marked improvement, the State college specialist declared.

"Farmers with breeding herds are not hurt seriously by these market reverses since feed is plentiful and low-priced," Case said. "The long time outlook for the man with the commercial herd of cattle to consume farm grown feeds and indirectly build up the productivity of the soil is bright and will remain so in spite of lower prices for fat cattle."
