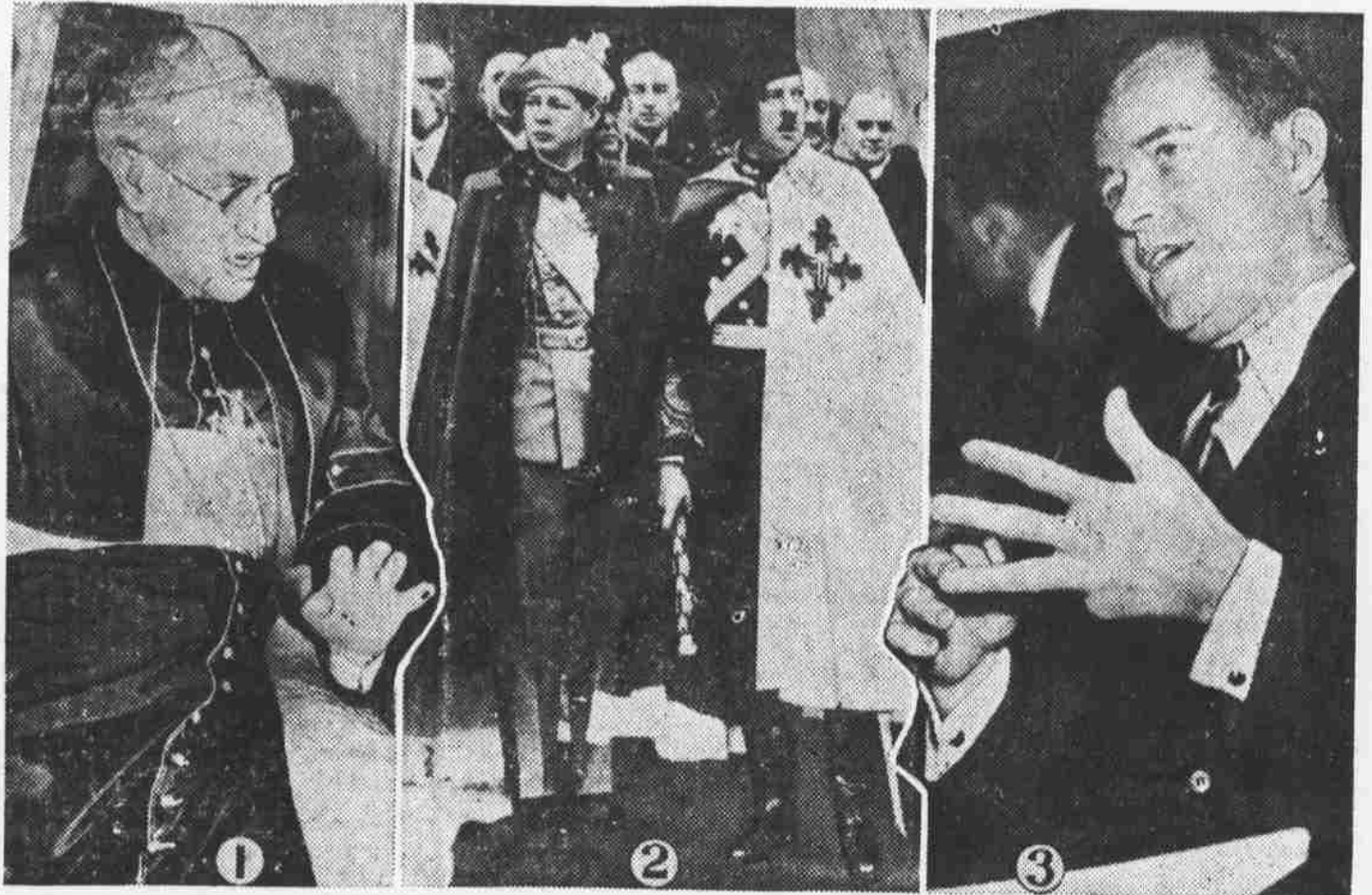
## SCHOOL NOTES
