The county chairmen, appointed by the governor, and the committeemen, appointed by the county chairmen, are to be active representatives of the governor and the state, in the matter of creating hospitality among the people of North Carolina and being host and hostess to the visitors who come to this state for recreational, business, industrial and other purposes.

Weather Station In Postoffice Building

A weather station, consisting of the necessary apparatus to measure rainfall, wind velocity, temperature and relative humidity, has been installed by the U. S. forest service at the postoffice building in Franklin in connection with the U. S. weather bureau.

The purpose of the weather station is mainly to secure additional data helpful to the fire suppression organization which is carried on by the Nantahala national forest.

Each morning the record of the amount of rainfall as well as the maximum and minimum temperatures for the preceding 24 hours is placed in the foyer of the postoffice building, for the information of the public. It is posted on the wall opposite the letter drop.

Farming In Ancient Israel

In ancient Canaan farms were assigned to the Hebrew families in perpetuity. The owner could rent or lease the homestead for not to exceed 50 years, but "the land shall not be sold for ever." Every 50th year was designated a "year of jubilee," when the owners or their rightful heirs could return and regain possession of their farms. The Hebrews took great pride in the ownership of real estate. Wooden plows broke the surface of the ground but did not turn it over. Hence after the plowing the men took mattocks and broke the large clods which had been loosened. "Judah shall plow, Jacob shall break his clods," wrote one of the minor prophets.
