#### Weather Station In Postoffice Building

A weather station, consisting of the necessary apparatus to measure rainfall, wind velocity, temperature and relative humidity, has been installed by the U. S. forest service at the postoffice building in Franklin in connection with the U. S. weather bureau.

Hence after the plowing the men took mattocks and broke the large clods which had been loosened. "Judah shall plow, Jacob shall break his clods," wrote one of the minor prophets.
