Inspect Asiatic Chestnut Plantation

An inspection of the Asiatic chestnut plantation in the Nantahala national forest was made this week by Dr. Haven Mitcalf and

Prof. R. Kent Beattie, principal pathologist in charge of foreign tree diseases, it was announced by Paul H. Gerard, supervisor of the Nantahala national forest.

The experimental plantings have been introduced for scientific study on sites occupied by the American chestnut. Chestnuts, formerly principal timber trees of the Appalachians, are nearly extinct due to the ravages of the chestnut blight. The Asiatic chestnut is resistant to the disease.
