Employment Campaign To Start In Macon

John D. Odom, senior interviewer of the government employment service, who has for some time been spending Monday and Tuesday of each week in Franklin, announces that, beginning next Monday, September 19, an additional man will be assigned here to assist him in his work. The new man will probably be Mr. Enloe, of Murphy.

Mr. Odom states an intensive campaign will begin in Macon county Monday to place those who are now on the employment service rolls in positions with private employers, and that he will begin making employer calls Monday, and hopes hereafter to put in three days instead of two in Franklin each week.

Tentative arrangements have been made for Mr. Odom to address the Franklin Rotary club at an early date on matters connected with his work.

Few housewives know that the employment service is prepared to furnish domestic help, subject to approval, and this is one of the matters Mr. Odom hopes to deal with in the coming campaign.

The employment service has already placed 50 men on jobs as laborers in Macon county with three road contractors who are working on projects in the county.
