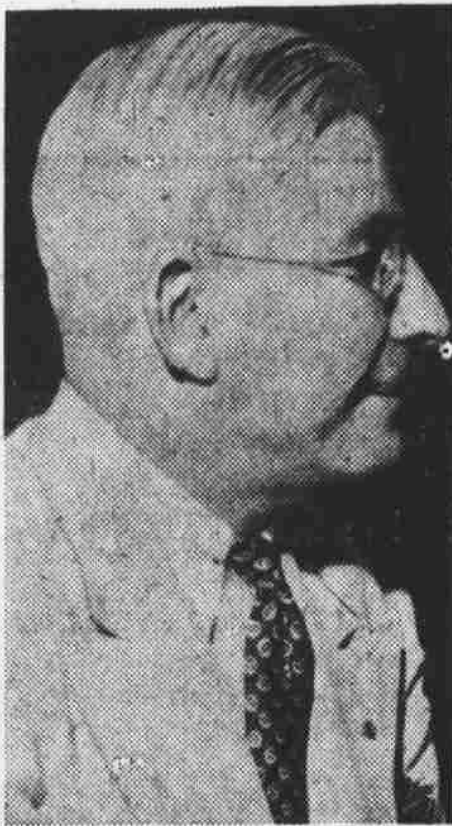

Grange Meets



L. J. Tabor, of Columbus, Ohio, master of the National Grange, presided today (Thursday, Nov. 17) when the organization opened its seventy-second annual convention at Portland, Ohio. The Grange, oldest and largest farm organization in the nation, advocates liberal farm credit and soil conservation. The convention will be climaxed Friday when the "seventh degree" is conferred on 5,000 candidates in traditional ceremonies.

State College Answers Timely Farm Questions

Q. Should my ewes receive any grain ration just before lambing?

A. The ewe should have a small ration of grain three to four weeks before lambing unless she is very fat. A mixture of one-half pound per head daily of corn and oats or corn alone will be sufficient providing a legume hay is fed. If the legume hay is not fed, the grain ration should contain from 30 to 35 per cent of cottonseed meal or linseed oil meal. Prior to three or four weeks before lambing it is not necessary to feed the ewes any grain unless the weather is severe and no grazing is available.

Q. What must I consider when selecting a tobacco plant bed site?

A. First, the bed should be located in a well-drained spot. It should also have southern or southwestern exposure so that the young plants will get all the sunshine possible. Select a loamy type of soil and locate the bed close to a water supply, if possible. It is also better to have several small beds widely

separated rather than one large bed. In this way, the chances for some of the beds escaping the blue mold are greatly increased. In selecting the new sites, get as far away as possible from old beds.

Q. Is it profitable to grade eggs before marketing?

A. Egg grading is not only practical and profitable, but it soon will be an absolute necessity if the egg industry is to go ahead. The public is beginning to demand a quality graded egg and the producer must, sooner or later, familiarize himself with standard egg grades and qualify as a producer of such a product. Not only do eggs of known grade command the high price on all markets, but the grading gives the producer an opportunity to cull his flock to better advantage and save only those hens that are producing the best eggs.
