Salute to a Salad

Here is a simple fusing together of fruit, cottage cheese and greens which makes a most fashionable figure at any occasion.

COTTAGE CHEESE FRUIT SALAD
2 teaspoons gelatine
3 tablespoons canned pineapple juice
2½ cups cottage cheese

Letuce or other greens
Sliced pineapple
Strawberries

Sprinkle the gelatine over the pineapple juice and dissolve over hot water. Add to the cottage cheese and mix well. Add a few grains of salt if desired. Pour into a mold which has been rinsed with cold water and chill. When firm unmold on lettuce or other greens and garnish with sliced pineapple and quartered or halved strawberries. Serve with French or salad dressing. Serves six to eight.
