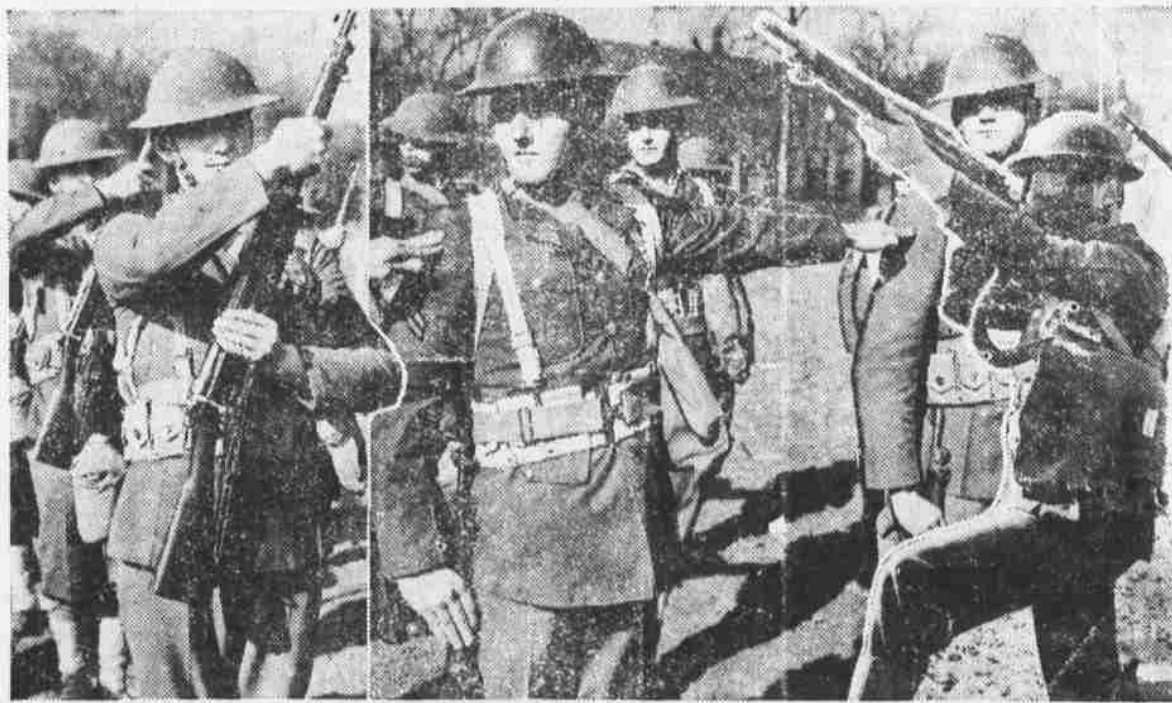

INTERESTING ARTICLE ABOUT THANKSGIVING

Since North Carolina is observing two Thanksgiving Days this year the following article anent the origin of Thanksgiving Day taken from an issue of Current Events published January 14, 1921, by the American Education Press, Inc., may be of interest: "The custom of observing an autumn day as a day of Thanksgiving for bountiful crops seems to have grown up in Massachusetts quite spontaneously and without authority of law. When the colonies were small, action by the local churches was enough. The first recorded Thanksgiving appointed by governmental authority was proclaimed in the colony of Massachusetts Bay for February 6, 1631. During the Revolution the Continental Congress eight times recommended to the several states the appointment of days of thanksgiving or of fasting. General Washington also proclaimed days of thanksgiving during the war and when he became president he appointed Thursday, November 26, 1789, as a Thanksgiving day throughout the Union. "It was in New England and especially in Massachusetts, that
