AND what is more beautiful than a fragrant, spicy, heart-tingling onion soup... an onion soup that is blended of both the earth and the heavens? Take a poll of family and guests, sometime, and note how strong a vote the fine old onion soup totals!

CREAM OF ONION SOUP

- 2 cups thinly sliced onions
- 3 tablespoons butter
- 5 tablespoons flour
- 4 1/2 cups milk
- Salt and pepper

- 6 toast rounds
- Grated American cheese

Fry the onions in butter over low heat until brown, stirring frequently. Add the flour and mix well. Add the milk gradually and cook, stirring constantly until thickened. Season with salt and pepper to taste and keep hot in a double boiler. Sprinkle the toast rounds with cheese and place under the broiler until the cheese is melted and slightly browned. Serve on the soup. Serves six.

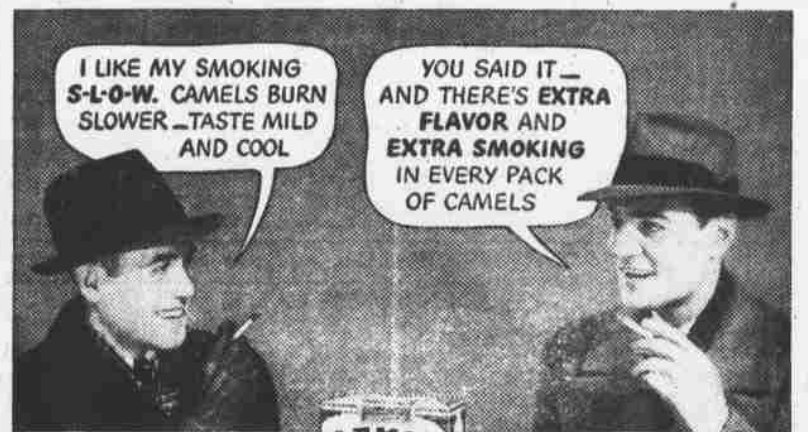

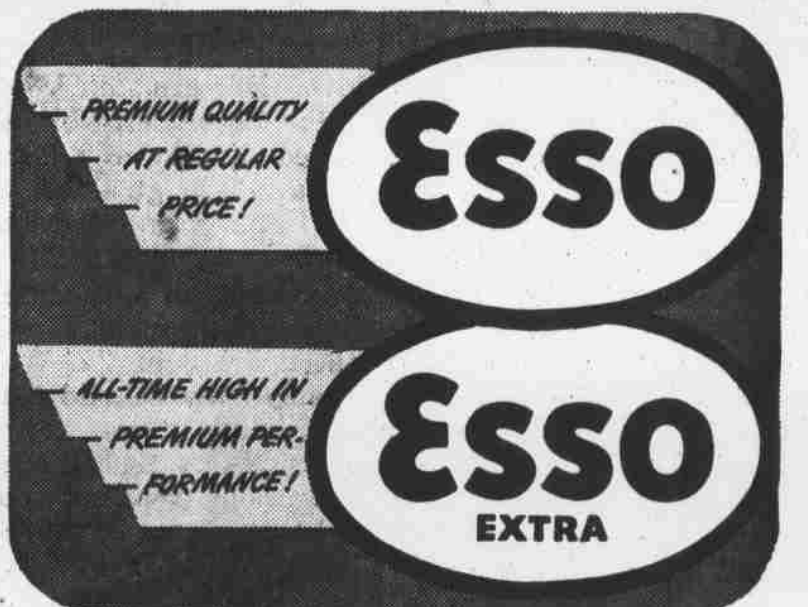
