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ISAIAH COMFORTS AN AFFLICTED PEOPLE

LESSON TEXT-Isaiah 40:1-11. GOLDEN TEXT-God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble.-Psalm 46:1.

"Comfort ye, comfort ye my people, saith the Lord," knowing as He alone can the great heart sob of sorrow, pain, and disappointment which arises to Him from His people everywhere. No study of God's Word which omits His tender word of comfort is in any sense complete. No teacher or preacher who fails to bring that message to his people is declaring the full counsel of God. No more appropriate passage could be chosen for presenting that truth than Isaiah 40.

The prophet spoke to a people who facing the devastation of their country and the deportation of its people into captivity. In such a desperate day one might say that there could be no true word of comfort, but there was, and that word may well encourage us to look up in this our confusing day. The Comforter of Israel is ready to be our comforter.

I. The Source of Comfort (vv. 1-5). "God is our refuge and strength" (Ps. 46:1). "Behold your God" (Isa. 40:9). "Comfort ye, saith your God" (v. 1). He is "the God of all comfort" (II Cor. 1:3). The astonishing thing is that mankind is so prone to seek comfort elsewhere, turning to God only when everything else fails rather than going to Him first of all.

His comfort is abiding, for it rests on a removal of the source of all pain and sorrow, namely sin. The day of Judah's comfort is to come when her "iniquity is pardoned" (v. 2). That is also the first step for us to take in seeking comfort. to repent and forsake our sin, seeking pardon in Christ.

The one who brings us God's comfort is Jesus Christ. Verses 3 to 5 speak of His coming. John the Baptist was the voice and it was Jesus for whom the way was to be prepared (see Luke 3:4-6). Jesus is the Lord Jehovah, God Himself, the Son of God, and the bringer of God's comfort to men's troubled hearts. It is He who is revealed in this pas-

Huey's Stand For Hull Meets Widespread Approval

It is not clear yet whether North Carolina will have a divided delegation to the Democratic national convention, but Gov. Hoey's declaring himself for Secretary of State, Hull may bring this about. In his statement last week the governor said that he did not believe that President Roosevelt would run, and requested that the North Carolina delegation should cast its first ballot for Hull, and not for himself, as has been the avowed

plan of those who favor a third term for President Roosevelt. Widespread Approval

Governor Hoey has declined comment since he issued his statement Thursday, but said last Saturday that the response to his stand was "one of the largest I have received on any action I have taken as Governor."

All the letters and telegrams he has received, Hoey said, praised his action. Some of them, he added came from other states. "I was surprised to find some letters from strong Roosevelt men," he said. Gov. Hoey's statement followed the organization of a "North Carolina for Roosevelt" movement by a group of Democratic leaders. were experiencing the bitter treat- The aim of the organization was ment of their enemies. They were to have this state's 26 votes in the Democratic national convention cast for Gov. Hoey on the first ballot and for Mr. Roosevelt on all subsequent ballots.

Governor Silent

The Governor declined comment as to what action, if any, he planned to take regarding control of the delegation. It was generally understood, before the Roosevelt movement was announced unexpectedly last Sunday, that Governor Hoey would have control of the delegation without any contest. The Governor has also remained silent on Secretary of State Hull's statement that he was not a candidate for any political office.

Positions Differ Little

Several members of the "North Carolina for Roosevelt" organization said there was really little difference between their position and that of Governor Hoey. Many members of their organization, they said, would be for Hull, if Mr. Roosevelt decided not to run. Governor Hoey, they pointed out, was on record as saying:

"It is generally conceded that if President Roosevelt is a candidate he will be nominated on the first ballot and probably without opposition."

The following letter comes from the secretary of the North Carolina Historical Commission:

Raleigh, N. C. April 17, 1940 Mrs. J. W. Cantey Johnson, Franklin, N. C.

The recently published Final Report of the United States De Soto Expedition Commission, House Document No. 71, 76th Congress, 1st Session, seems to settle the long-mooted question of whether De Soto and his party passed through the present territory of North Carolina. According to this report, he passed either through or near the town of Highlands, and went through both Franklin and Murphy. It seems that not only can the route be plotted, but even that the exact dates when the party stopped at various points can be ascertained. The date that De Soto was at Franklin is given as May 20, 1540 (old style), and the

exact dates when he was at other points in Western North Carolina are also available. At a meeting a few days ago, the

Executive Committee on Historical Markers voted to mark the route De Soto followed in North Carolina. All of the inscriptions will have to be approved by Dr. J. R. Swanton of the Smithsonian Institution, who headed the commission making the report. Securing Dr. Swanton's approval will result in some delay, and probably the markers will not be ready for a good many weeks, or even months. This march of De Soto's was one of the most important events in all the history of North Carolina. Within the past few years Sir

Walter Raleigh's efforts to colonize Roanoke Island have received a great deal of attention, but De Soto made his expedition almost half a century earlier-within less than 50 years after Columbus had discovered the New World.

In view of the great significance of this event, and in view of the fact that this year marks its four hundredth anniversary, I am wondering whether Western North Carolina will not wish to stage some kind of celebration, especially in the towns along De Soto's route. Commission will be glad to assist is done along this line.

"I am the master of my fate, I am the captain of my soul." But God says, "Man is as grass," and declares that when "the spirit of the Lord bloweth" on him he fades and withers. We know that God's witness is true. Boast as he will in the hour of prosperity and strength, man knows in his heart that when he faces the real issues of life he is utterly impotent, needy and undone. Gerald Massey spoke more truly than William Henley when he said,

"Surrounded by unnumbered foes Against my soul the battle goes!"

The man who has come to the end of himself and who realizes that there is neither in him nor in his fellow mortals the strength to meet life's struggles is ready for the ministry of God in Christ, forgiving, cleansing, strengthening and comforting. He has come to realize that "the grass withereth, the flower fadeth, but the word of our God shall stand forever" (v. 8).

III. The Way of Comfort (vv. 9-11). Good tidings were proclaimed even in that dark hour of Judah's history. We have good tidings for our day as well. Let us declare them from the mountaintops.
