Benefit Payments To Unemployed Announced

RALEIGH, June 26.—Total receipts of the North Carolina Unemployment Compensation fund through June 20 were \$36,008,480.80, which includes \$35,200,313.05 in contributions of employers subject to the law and \$802,167.81 earned as interest on the State Fund's balance in the U. S. Treasury, Charles G. Powell, commission chairman announces.
Benefit payments to unemployed and partially unemployed workers from January, 1938, and through June 20, reached \$14,742,439.97, which leaves a balance in the fund as of that date of \$21,266,040.89. About \$750,000 to \$800,000 of this is due to go to the Railroad Retirement Fund when the amount is definitely determined. The balance is divided between individual employers' reserve funds and the pooled fund.
LIME
Farmers have already obtained two and a half times as much lime under the 1940 grant-of-aid program as they requested during the entire 1939 season, says an AAA summary.
