In Washington President Roosevelt requested that Congress increase capitalization of the Export-Import Bank by \$500,000,000 so that it "may be of greater assistance to our neighbors south of the Rio Grande."

WASHINGTON

The United States has denounced Soviet Russia's bloodless conquest of Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania as "predatory" by Soviet Russia. U. S. envoys have been recalled. It is reported that Finland is being obligated to follow Russia's orders to disarm.

HEAT RECORDS BROKEN

The longest and broadest heat wave of 1940 reaches a new crest as temperatures throughout the country soar, and many deaths are reported from heat exhaustion and drownings. Storms in this area relieved the high temperature yesterday.

34 TOBACCO COMPANIES INDICTED

The department of justice yesterday indicted 34 tobacco companies including the "Big Four", Reynolds, Liggett and Myers, American and P. Lorillard companies of practices "which have been deliberately designed to dominate and dictate terms" to growers and sellers of tobacco described as "harsh and oppressive." The charges have been denied already by several companies.

MILITARY TRAINING

The senate military committee has given its approval to compulsory military training calling for registration of 42,000,000 men between 18 and 64 years.

CANTON TRAINING CENTER

Shop training that will equip men for service in key industries for national defense began in Canton Monday with 12 students above 18 years enrolled. The school will continue 12 weeks.

HIWASSEE DAM COMPLETED

Hiwassee Dam on the Hiwassee river near Murphy, constructed by TVA, is completed after four years of building. The dam is 1,287 feet long, 307 feet high, and requires a total of 794,000 cubic yards of concrete in buildings.

State College Answers Timely Farm Questions

Q. How much silage should I put up for each cow in my herd?
A. This will depend on the breed of animals and on the length of the feeding period. The average Jersey or Guernsey cow will consume from 30 to 35 pounds of silage a day while the Ayrshire or Holstein cow will need from 40 to 50 pounds a day. If you plan to feed silage for six months from three to four and one-half tons should be provided for each mature cow in the herd.

Q. What is the most effective remedy for ridding my poultry flock of lice?

A. Sodium floride is probably the most effective product according to poultry specialists at State college. The powder may be secured at any drug store and may be applied in three ways. Methods of application are given in Extension Circular No. 160 and copies may be obtained free upon application to the Agricultural Editor at State college. The booklet also gives methods for control of other common parasites.
