Cartoogechaye Gives Canned Tomatoes To Flood-Stricken Homes

Fifteen dozen quarts of tomatoes and tomato juice have been canned by the members of the Woman's Missionary Society of Mount Zion Methodist church on Cartoogechaye for distribution among the flood-stricken families in Jackson county.

(Reports from the Jackson county Red Cross this week state that 238 families have registered for aid).

Five dozen quarts and five dozen half-gallon jars were furnished by the Red Cross through Harley Cabe, county chairman. The tomatoes were donated by Carl Slagle.

The society plans to can more next week, if the tomatoes are obtainable.

Individual cakes decorated with white icing and pink rosebud were served to the guests. Mrs. A. R. Higdon presided over the punch bowl.

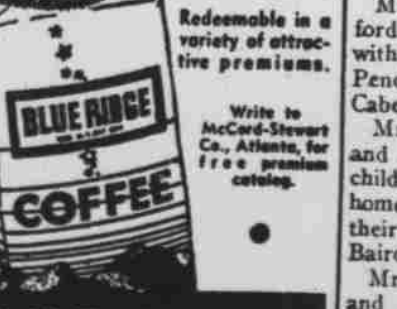
The bride-elect was the recipient of many lovely and useful gifts from more than 50 friends who called during the afternoon.

TROUT SEASON REPORTED GOOD

1,012 Fishermen Visited The Five Areas In Forest

A check for \$506 has just been received from C. N. Mease, chief refuge supervisor for the N. C. division of game and inland fisheries, states Charles Melichar, forest supervisor of the Nantahala Forest at Franklin. This represents 50 per cent of the fee money collected from each fisherman who enjoyed the good fishing on the cooperative wildlife management areas on the Nantahala during the past trout season. Each year the amount collected at \$1 per day per fisherman gets larger as more people learn of the good fishing to be had on these areas. The \$506 check means that 1012 sportsmen availed themselves of the streams stocked and protected under the cooperative wildlife management agreement existing between the N. C. department of conservation and development and the United States forest service.

There are five areas on the Nantahala national forest which are protected by the state game protectors: Fires Creek area in Clay county, Santetlah area in Graham county, and Cliffside Lake, Wayah, and Standing Indian areas in Macon county.

Cliffside Lake had the longest average fish caught, averaging 9.9 inches. Wayah provided the best fishing, with the highest average catch of 8.4 fish per fisherman. Fires Creek in Clay county was the most popular, with 309 permits sold.

This was the first year for Santetlah area in Graham county, and the 153 fishermen caught 5.9 fish each, averaging 8.2 inches in length. Further stocking and protection is bound to develop this area into the outstanding fisherman's retreat which its natural assets give promise of.

Cliffside Lake also was open for its first year and yielded the largest fish per catch, but the majority of fishermen insisted on fishing the surface of the lake rather than fishing deep, resulting in a low catch per sportsman. It is hoped next year that fishermen will come equipped to fish the lake bottom.

Standing Indian area was average, with 205 fishermen catching 4.3 fish each, averaging 8.5 inches in length. Considerable trouble was experienced with catching fish just under the legal limit which will be corrected this next year. Also it is hoped to construct a motor way up the river from White Oak Bottoms along the old railroad right-of-way to allow better distribution of fish and fishermen up the river.
