J. S. Gray, of Franklin Route 2, has accepted a position in Macon, Ga.

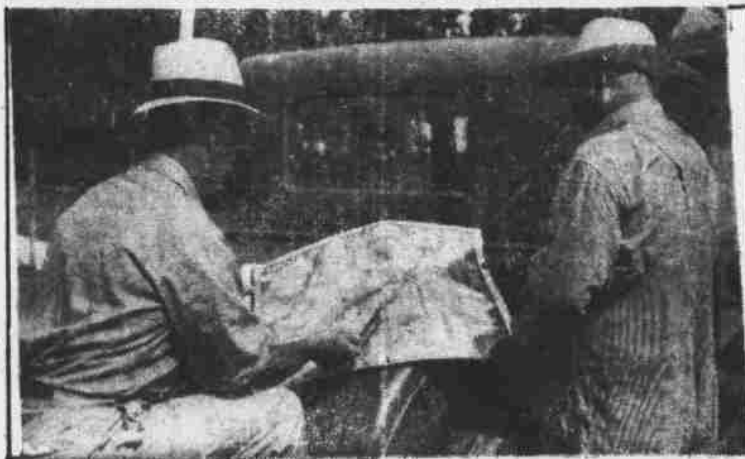
Mrs. Gilmer A. Jones who has been confined to her room with influenza, is reported much improved.

Two Varieties of Air Defense



America and North Carolina rely on airplanes for National defense and soil defense. Heavily armed planes such as the giant four-motored "flying fortress" at top are frequently seen flying over the state. They help provide National defense. Thousands of North Carolina farmers, like the two pictured beside the truck, have been supplied aerial photographs of their farms, similar to the one shown here. The Agricultural Adjustment Administration has made aerial photos of about 40,397 of the 48,740 square miles of agricultural land in North Carolina. Aerial photography in connection with the AAA farm program was started in the State in 1936 and in 1940 performance in the program was checked through aerial photos in 80 counties. As a part of their educational work, county farm agents of the State College Extension Service show farmers how to use the aerial photographs to check their compliance with the program.
