The Day After Serving Roast

AFTER YOU have served a roast of meat, you later serve it sliced cold, of course. I hope you like it that way as well as I do. But for the next meal you must make hash or some other dish likely to meet with the family approval. This easy cottage pie may solve that little problem for you.

Easy Cottage Pie Corn Pudding
Waldorf Salad
New England Lemon Pie

Easy Cottage Pie
2 cps. diced cooked lamb 1 can vegetable soup
2 tbsps. lard 2 tbsps. flour
3 tbsps. four potatoes
Brown lamb in the lard, sprinkle flour over meat and blend well, then add the vegetable soup and stir until thick and boiling. Put mixture into casserole, cover with mashed potatoes, and brown in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for about 15 minutes.

New England Lemon Pie
1 cp. sugar 1 tbsps. butter
Pinch of salt Grated rind and juice 1 lemon
3 tbsps. flour Pie dough
1 egg, well beaten 1 cp. milk
Mix sugar, salt and flour together; add egg and beat well. Melt butter and add with grated lemon rind and juice, and last, milk, adding last item very slowly. Pour into unbaked pie shell, cover with another crust and bake in moderate oven (375 degrees F.).

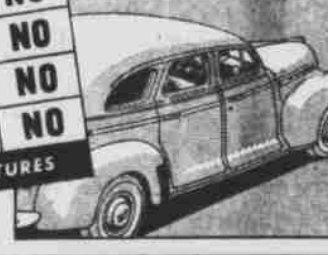
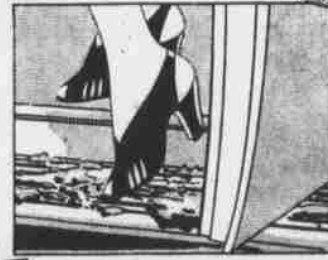
