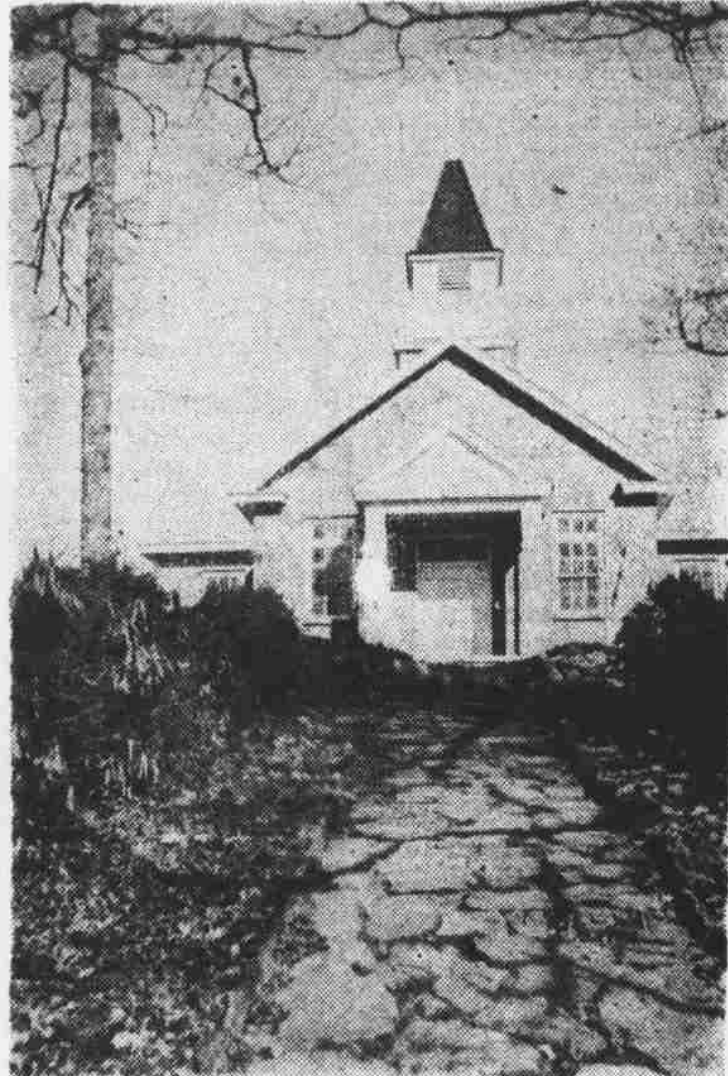
Health Department Reports Highlands Maternity Clinic

A new maternity clinic was opened in Highlands, Friday, February 7, in the Satula Club room, with Dr. Gilbert Beecher in charge. The public health nurses assisting at the clinic were Miss Alma Kee, district supervising nurse, from Waynesville, Mrs. Josephine D. Gaines, from Macon county, and Mrs. Doris Hicks from Swain county. The local health officer, Dr. E. N. Haller, was also kept busy at the clinic.

The necessary care and attention of expectant mothers will be made available at these clinics, which are to be held each month on the first Friday, at 2 p. m. in the Satula Club room. Physical examinations, routine tests, monthly check-ups and consultations with the doctor in charge will be provided at each clinic. For the use of the Satula Club building in the Highlands community, for the fuel furnished by an interested citizen, and through the support of an active P. T. A. member, the health department is duly grateful.

Beautiful New Baptist Church In Highlands

Congregation Now Using Building For Their Services

Services are being held each week in the new Baptist church here, although the interior of the building has not yet been completed. The beautiful stone-venered structure is the third in which the church has worshipped since it was organized about 50 years ago. This building was begun in July, 1940, under the leadership of Rev. J. G. Benfield, who has been the pastor since June, 1938. There are nine Sunday School rooms around the main auditorium, six of which can be used as a part of the auditorium. Back of the pulpit platform are a baptistery and three rooms. There is also a large basement where a heating plant is to be installed and several additional Sunday school rooms equipped. Upon coming to this charge Mr. Benfield found an inadequate church building, an unfinished pastory, and a burdensome debt. The debts were soon liquidated, more real estate added to the church property, and a building launched. In all of this work the efforts of Mrs. Benfield have been as earnest and tireless as those of her husband.

The church is being built on the pay-as-you-go plan, which accounts for the unfinished interior. Members and friends of the church have put about \$4,000 into the present structure, and it is estimated that when finished the entire cost will be some seven or eight thousand dollars.
