**Mattress Project Closes Temporarily**

Due to the fact that a new shipment of cotton received last week was found to be unfit for use, the mattress project is closed until a new shipment arrives.

Those who began work on this lot of cotton became ill from a still unknown cause. Those affected have all recovered, and have suffered no after effects, but the project was promptly closed until the cause could be investigated. Samples of the cotton were sent to Raleigh and Washington for chemical analysis. It is reported from Raleigh that the same shipment sent to other places in North Carolina had a like effect upon those working with it. Since there is no precedent of this occurrence, the result of the investigation is awaited with much interest, and will be announced as soon as possible. Every precaution is being taken by the Department of Agriculture that this will not occur again.
