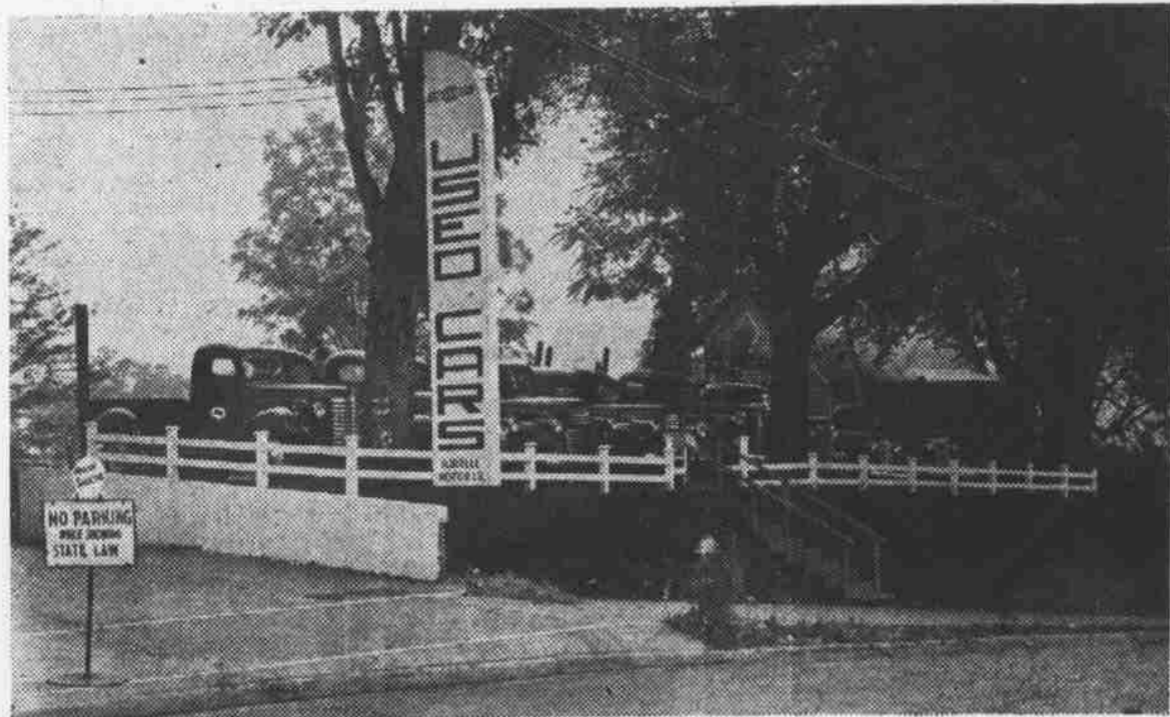

MOCK CHICKEN SALAD (First Prize)
One quart can of tenderloin put through food chopper, on coarse cutter.
1/2 dozen hard cooked eggs diced
2 tablespoons minced parsley or water cress
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1 teaspoon celery salt
3 to 4 tablespoons mayonnaise
Serve on lettuce, or for picnic sandwiches.

GRAHAM MUFFINS (Second Prize)
1 cup graham flour
1 cup white flour

2 teaspoons baking powder
1 egg
1 1/2 cups sweet milk
2 tablespoons melted shortening.
Beat egg, add sugar, salt and shortening. Add milk and flour to which baking powder has been added. Bake in muffin rings in hot oven.

STUFFED GREEN PEPPERS (Third Prize)
6 green peppers
1 cup left over meat cut fine (Veal, ham, or beef)
1/2 cup bread crumbs
1 onion chopped fine
2 fresh tomatoes
1/2 cup meat broth.
Wash peppers, cut a piece from stem end of each and remove seeds. Parboil for five minutes. Stuff with a mixture of the meat, bread crumbs or rice, stock and seasonings, and top with buttered crumbs. Place in baking dish, pour broth or water around them to cover bottom of pan and bake.

Draft Records Open For Public Inspection

All non-confidential information concerning Selective Service registrants is a matter of public record and must be made available to any person upon request during business hours of local boards in North Carolina. General J. Van B. Metts, state director of selective service, declared today. However, the public is not permitted to handle records.

The only data to be withheld as confidential are the records of the physical condition of a registrant, all answers on the questionnaire under the subject of dependency, except the names and addresses of claimed dependents, the answers to questions on previous military service, and the registrant's court record.

Pointing out that Selective Service Form 100, the Classification Record of Registrants, contains practically all pertinent information of a non-confidential nature, Director Metts emphasized that this form is subject to examination by the public during local board business hours.

This record includes the name of the registrant, his order number, his serial number, his age and his race.

If he volunteered, the date of his volunteering is shown. If his record is transferred to another board for the purpose of classification, physical examination or induction, the date of such transfer and the date of the return of the registrant's record from the transfer board are indicated.

It further shows whether the registrant was placed in Class I-A, I-B, I-C, I-D or I-E, or Class II-A or II-B, or Class III, or Class IV-A, B, C, D, E or F. If the registrant makes a request to appear before the local board, that date is recorded as is the date fixed for his appearance and a notation as to whether he did appear.

This Classification Record (Form 100) also shows the date of an appeal to the Board of Appeal, the date when the registrant's record is sent to the Appeal Board, the date of the decision of the Appeal Board, and whether or not the classification was continued.

The Treasury Department or the Federal Reserve Banks will hold your Defense Savings Bonds for safekeeping free of charge.

DEFENSE BOND Quiz

Q. Where should I keep my Defense Savings Bonds?
A. In a safe place, because they have value which constantly increases. If you wish, the Treasury Department or any Federal Reserve Bank will hold them in safekeeping for you without charge, giving you a receipt.
Q. Does an album filled with Stamps automatically become a Bond that will pay interest and mature in 10 years?
A. No. The completed album must be exchanged for a Bond. Regardless of the amount of money you have invested in Stamps, they will not bear interest until they are in the form of a Bond or Bonds.
