

Dairymen Requested To Increase Supply

> The greatest need for increased production under the mation's gi gantic food-for-defense program in 1942 lies in the field of dairying, says John A. Arey, extension dairyman of N. C. State college.

Yet existing facilities for production in relation to probable needs indicate that dairy farmers of the country face a different task in meeting the national 1942 production goal of 125,000,000,006 pounds, an increase of 7 per cent over the 117,000,000,000 pounds expected to be produced in 1941.

However, North Carolina farmers will find the demand not too difficult to meet, since they have been asked to increase production by only"4 per cent. This year it is estimated that Tar Heel cows will give 1,462,000,000 pounds of milk. Next year their goal has been set at 1,520,000,000. The goal for Macon farmers is for the increase of 564,000 pounds of milk and an increase of 110 milk cows.

At the same time, North Carolinians have been asked to add 10,000 milk cows to their herds by next year. Cow population this year
