

Macon Men In Service Listed By Local Board

Figures And Names For Year's Operation Of Selective Service

At the end of one year's operation of Selective Service in Macon County, it will probably be of interest to the citizens to know their county's contribution of manpower to National Defense. The Local Board has sent 133 men to induction stations, and out of 133, 24 were rejected for military duty and 109 accepted.

Of these 133 registrants there were 69 volunteers and of the 69 volunteers sent to induction stations 56 were accepted for military service and 13 rejected. Sixty-four selectees have been sent to induction stations and 53 of these were accepted and 11 rejected, leaving a total in military training from this Board 109.

Eleven of the 69 volunteers were under age, nine of whom were accepted for duty, and two rejected. In addition to the above figures, 19 registrants of this board have volunteered at recruiting stations for service in the Army, Navy, Ma-

lines and Air Service. Of the 2048 registrants with this Board, all of whom have been sent their questionnaires, there is only one questionnaire not filled out and returned.

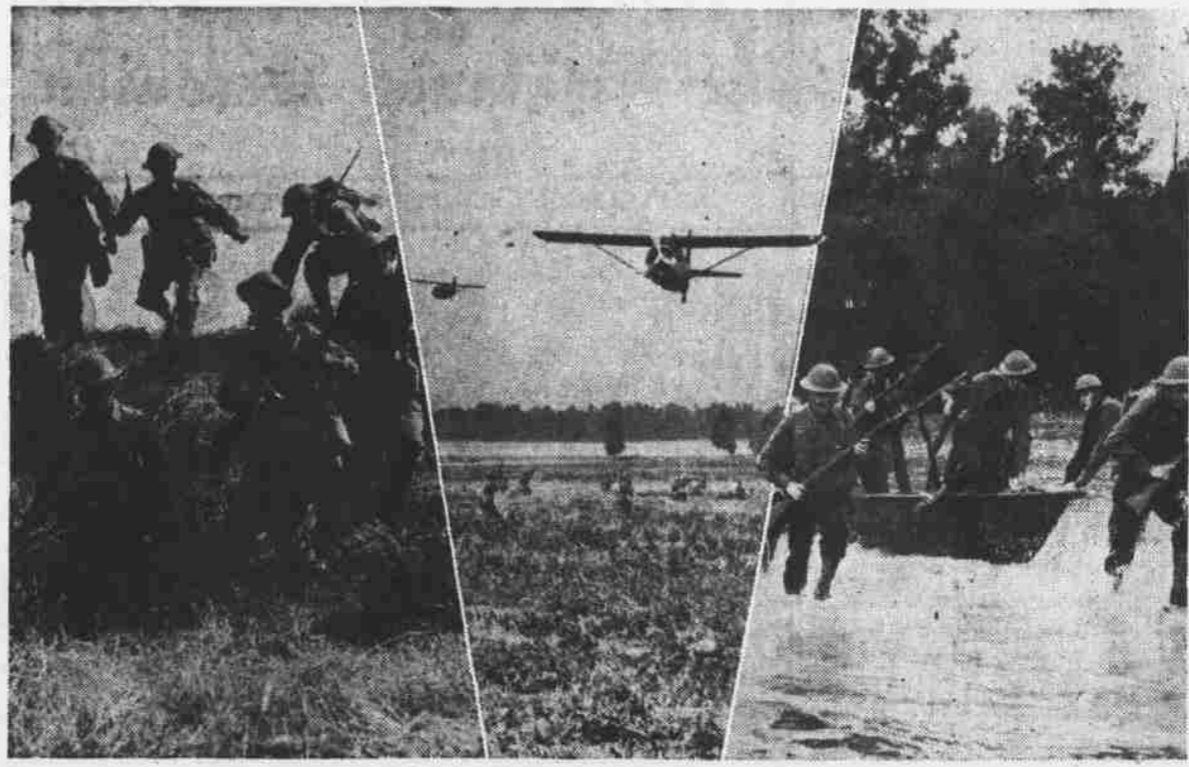

Dairymen Requested To Increase Supply

The greatest need for increased production under the nation's gigantic food-for-defense program in 1942 lies in the field of dairying, says John A. Arey, extension dairyman of N. C. State college.

Yet existing facilities for production in relation to probable needs indicate that dairy farmers of the country face a different task in meeting the national 1942 production goal of 125,000,000,000 pounds, an increase of 7 per cent over the 117,000,000,000 pounds expected to be produced in 1941.

However, North Carolina farmers will find the demand not too difficult to meet, since they have been asked to increase production by only 4 per cent. This year it is estimated that Tar Heel cows will give 1,462,000,000 pounds of milk. Next year their goal has been set at 1,520,000,000. The goal for Macon farmers is for the increase of 564,000 pounds of milk and an increase of 110 milk cows.

At the same time, North Carolinians have been asked to add 10,000 milk cows to their herds by next year. Cow population this year
