Army Physicians To Examine Draftees

According to an announcement by General J. Van B. Metts, state director of the selective service, the present system of examination for induction into the army will be changed after January 1, 1942.

The examining physicians of the various boards and the medical advisory boards—all of whom serve without pay—will continue to function, serving as a "screen" to eliminate men "permanently unfit" for the army, but the final army examination of registrants from throughout this area will be conducted in Asheville.

A considerable number of selectees in the past have been rejected at the induction center, and it is explained that the new move is to avoid having these men sent to camp and then sent back home again.

The new system is expected to be put into effect January 1. Men making up the draft quota for December and January will be examined as before, with the army physicians examining men slated to go to camp in February.
