Miss Norton said also that the club expects to be able to take pictures of other students at school.

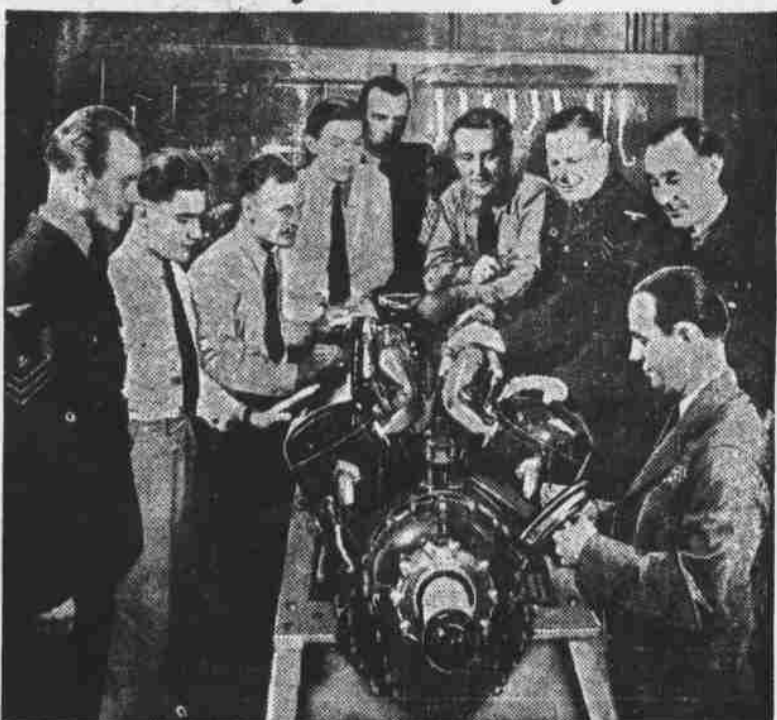
MRS. HICKS TO SPEND WINTER IN ARIZONA
