Sealed bids will be received by the Regional Forester, Glenn Building, Atlanta, Georgia, up to and including May 4, 1942, for all the live timber marked or designated for cutting and all the merchantable dead timber located on areas embracing about 2,130 acres within the Rhinehart Prong-Sugar Cove Compartments, Little Tennessee River Watershed, Macon County, Nantahala National Forest, North Carolina, estimated to be 1,438 M feet, more or less, of yellow poplar, black cherry, sugar maple, northern red oak, basswood, cucumber, white ash, white oak, white pine, black oak, chestnut oak, red maple, birch, scarlet oak, pitch pine, and unestimated amounts of hickory, beech, buckeye, hemlock and tanbark of chestnut oak and hemlock. The removal of hickory, beech, buckeye and hemlock at \$1.75 per MBM, and tanbark at \$1.50 per ton (2000 lbs.) will be optional with the purchaser. No bid of less than \$11.00 per M feet for yellow poplar, black cherry, and sugar maple; \$9.50 for northern red oak, basswood, cucumber, and white ash; \$6.75 for white oak; \$4.75 for white pine; \$4.00 for chestnut; \$3.75 for black oak and chestnut oak; \$2.75 for red maple, birch, and scarlet oak, and \$2.50 for pitch pine will be considered. ## Youth Hostel

### Group To Visit Highlands To Arrange Link

A group of youth hostellers from Atlanta is expected to arrive in Highlands some time Friday on their way from Asheville to Atlanta. The high school students, with their leader, Martha B. Hoagland, director of the Georgia Area Council of American Youth Hostels, Inc., hope to interest the people of Highlands and surrounding towns in establishing a link in the chain of overnight stopping places for cyclists between Atlanta and Western North Carolina, where a loop of eleven hostels have been set up since 1938. With the current emphasis on physical fitness, parents will be glad to know of this supervised and inexpensive way to adventure.

Ernest Ackerly, an enthusiastic hosteller, said "a youth hostel is an overnight stopping place, usually a farm house or perhaps a parsonage, whose owners just like to have young people around. We do our own cooking and cleaning up, and try to leave the hostel better than we found it. Often we help do some of the chores around the place. You see the overnight fee is only 25 cents, with the small charge of five or ten cents for fuel. Youth hostels make it possible for us high school students to have a fine vacation on about a dollar a day."

A youth hostel is a community project, sponsored by a community committee who selects hostel and houseparents, and assured maintenance of youth hostel standards. Each hostel provides bunks, mattresses, blankets and heavy cooking equipment. The hostels are located in chains or loops approximately 18 miles apart for the convenience of hikers as well as bikers. The so-called dormitories—one for boys and one for girls—are very often converted corn cribs, attics, garages, etc., with a place for cooking.

The idea of youth hosteling first began in Europe in 1910. It was brought to America in 1934, and at present there are 253 chartered hostels in the United States. Hosteling is conducted under the auspices of American Youth Hostels, Inc., a non-profit corporation with headquarters at Northfield, Mass.

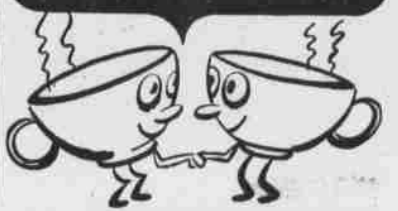
