

Farm-Home Week, 4-H Short Course Cancelled

Shortages of transportation and labor have led to the cancellation of Farm and Home Week and 4-H short courses, annual events on the State College summer calendar, it was announced by Dean E. O. Schaub, director of the Extension Service. He also mentioned the fact that housing accommodations at the college this summer will be another problem, due to the fact that N. C. State is on a "war-time basis" and will be used to train 1,000 or more technological students for emergency work.

One of the main factors in reaching this decision is the matter of transportation. With the very critical situation as regards rubber, and the rationing of gasoline which will become effective May 15, the question of transportation becomes a major factor. Already bus and rail facilities are running at capacity, and quite often public utilities have to cancel regular schedules in order to take care of troop movements.

The matter of labor on the farms is likewise of great importance. Agriculture is called upon to produce more than ever before with a decided decrease in available labor. Consequently, it is felt that many farm people would feel their patriotic duty to remain at home to take care of agricultural production rather than attend meetings of this kind.

The County 4-H Club encampments at Millstone, White Lake and Swannanoa will be carried out as planned.

Application Of AAA Lime Shows Increase In State

In line with the nation's wartime need for large increases of certain essential crops, and continuance of soil conservation practices, North Carolina farmers are increasing use of crushed limestone as a soil building material, according to E. Y. Floyd, AAA executive assistant of State college.

For the period from November 1, 1941, through May 6, 1942, farmers of the state ordered 236,800 tons of limestone from the Agricultural Adjustment Agency for

use on pasture lands, hay crops, and small grain. For the corresponding period of the previous year, he declared, 11,471 tons of 20 percent superphosphate have been ordered this year.

"The current transportation situation is making it more difficult to obtain supplies of limestone within a short time after orders are received," he said. "This situation probably will grow worse as troop and war materials movements place an additional burden on railroad facilities."

The AAA official pointed out that, in placing orders for fall delivery farmers should give proper consideration to the possible shortage of other materials which now are going for war purposes, and that needs should be considered in relation to the war production program.

Milk Emphasized In War Programs

RALEIGH May 11.—An intensive campaign to further promote the consumption of milk and other dairy products as a contribution to the war effort will be launched throughout the State in June the State Department of Agriculture announced today.

Milk is ammunition essential to the protection of health. Its use as a vital food should be promoted throughout the State in health programs. North Carolina's contribution to the war effort can only be as valuable as the strength of its owner.
