Bus Schedule

Will Be Boon To Summer Guests Affected By Gas Rationing

The present excellent bus schedule which provides daily passenger service to Highlands from Atlanta, Asheville, Franklin, Greenville, S. C., and Knoxville, Tenn., will be a boon to persons in the gas-rationed area who have been spending their summers in Highlands, as well as to those who wish to come here for the first time.

The bus leaving Atlanta at 11 o'clock in the morning reaches Highlands at 4:15 in the afternoon, coming in over the Dillard Highway.

An equally good schedule from Asheville, Greenville and Knoxville has been in effect for the past several weeks, with two buses a day from Asheville. The bus leaving Asheville at 9:15 in the morning gets to Highlands at 11:45, and the afternoon bus leaving Asheville at 6:30 reaches here at 9 o'clock in the evening.

Folders giving the schedule of the different buses are now being distributed by the Chamber of Commerce.
